New OSC Building Ready to Serve Food Industries

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Up-to-the-minute research and instructional facilities for servicing a more than \$100,000,000 Oregon industry were formally dedicated at Oregon State college recently when the new three-quarter million dollar food technology building was officially turned over to the college.

The new building and its facilities will be an added responsibility of OSC to the state, President A. L. Strand said, but it is only one unit in a larger research organization. Dr. Strand emphasized the increasing importance in scientific research of broad, cooperative effort between many individuals, departments and institutions.

Chancellor Charles D. Byrne of the state system of higher education said the new building is "a tribute to an institution that dared to pioneer a new field in research and education after sensing a great need in the state and nation." OSC was the first college in the country to establish a department of food technology 32 years ago.

Under the direction of E. H. Wiegand, the department has made a tremendous contribution to the state and nation that cannot accurately be measured in dollars and cents, Dr. Byrne said, but "we do know it has contributed untold millions in wealth and immeasurable benefits in well-being to the people of Oregon."

Edgar W. Smith, president, and Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, chairman of the building committee of the state board of higher education, praised the educational and research work of the department. They predicted that cost of the new building will be returned many times over to the state as its functions and services to the food industry multiply. F. E. Price, dean of agriculture, presided at the dedication ceremonies.

Fish Waste May Help Maintain NW Salmon Runs

Fish waste is being studied by the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station as a possible source of salmon hatchery food.

With artificial propagation of salmon under consideration as one means of maintaining salmon runs of the Northwest, tremendous amounts of hatchery food may be needed, according to R. O. Sinnhuber of the Seafoods laboratory at Astoria where salmon diets are being studied.

To meet the expected hatchery food requirements, the experiment station and the Oregon Fish Commission have turned to fish waste as a possible answer. Experiments are in progress at Astoria on nutritional and economical diets utilizing fish waste.

Food is prepared and compounded at the laboratory and feeding experiments are conducted at Bonneville dam.

Tests have already demonstrated that spring Chinook salmon can be raised successfully through winter. They have also proved that salt or a mixture of mineral salts is important in the growth of young chinook salmon.

Success has been recorded with high fat diets despite the general belief that low fat diets are most desirable for raising hatchery fish, Sinnhuber reported.

Use of beef liver, probably one of the most important components in fish diets, is restricted by cost and availability.

Research in the past has demonstrated that a substance called "Factor M" is necessary for growth in trout. Experiments with salmon at Bonneville dam have shown that such a factor also exists for salmon. A new series of tests will be aimed at learning the contribution to maximum fish growth.
