### Budget Committee

The council fire committee was requested to meet with the rural fire district board in the near future to try to iron out the fire department problem before the budget is completed. According to the way the rural district is operated, the man on the board may have up to a 4 mill limit for fire protection without a vote of the people. At present the levy is 2.8, or about \$8,000. The difference between the \$5,000 given the city for fire protection and the amount collected is put into a sinking fund for equipment.

The city's west side bridge over the coast fork of the Willamette came into discussion at the budget session when the street fund was being viewed.

Mr. Wiese said he believed the structure should be replaced and that the city should float a bond issue to finance the project.

The bridge, which is at least 50 years old, has moved some recently on its west foundation, according to the city engineer. Use of the bridge is restricted and loaded logging trucks can no longer use it.

One suggestion made by City Recorder Don Allen was that the city could place several thousand dollars a year in a budget sinking fund that would provide for construction in a few years. Cost is estimated at about \$70,000.
