Hiway Commission To Meet 13th, 14th

The State Highway Commission will hold its next regular meeting in Portland on March 13 and 14, at which time and place it will receive bids on 34 highway, bridge, building and rock projects, involving an estimated expenditure of \$4,700,000.

For Lane county the commission will receive bids March 14 for the construction of a comfort station for the convenience of visitors at the Devils Elbow State Park near the Heecta Head lighthouse north of Florence. These services are being furnished in accordance with the policy of the commission to improve the state parks.

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Knickerbocker Application for Class B Restaurant License Deferred at Hearing

Application of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Knickerbocker for a class B restaurant license was deferred by the Oregon Liquor commission at a hearing in the council chambers in the city hall Saturday afternoon.

The hearing, which drew a capacity crowd, lasted for more than two hours. The request of the Knickerbockers, previously refused presumably on the grounds that the Grove Tavern had no kitchen facilities, was presented to the commission by Milligan and Brown, Eugene attorneys. More than a dozen people were called by Sid Milligan to express their opinions as to the qualifications of Mr. Knickerbocker. Many called to testify were tavern and extra-tavern operators.

All persons called by Mr. Milligan said they felt Mr. Knickerbocker was capable of operating a clean place. However two people called had a slightly different angle. Mrs. Mabel Gates objected to so many empty bottles being thrown on her property and said she felt that a place where the bottles would be parked would stop this sort of thing. The same sentiment was echoed by Mrs. Lavina Rearkick.

Useless to Prolong

After hearing expressions from Sherwood Smith, minister of the Gibbs Avenue Church of Christ, the presiding chairman for the liquor commission said he thought it was useless to prolong the hearing since it had then lasted almost two hours and since the commis-

sion could not pass on the application of the Grove Tavern until it had inspected the kitchen facilities. However the commission later said short expressions were in order for the opposition. Bob Beach, answering some earlier statement that a place on Main street where bottles might be taken inside would stop the promiscuous throwing of bottles on the streets, said an establishment of this sort would not stop the throwing of bottles because the people who did this would not patronize a place of this sort.

W. C. Martin asked if it was the policy of the commission to encourage the increasing consumption of liquor by providing additional outlets and if so how the commission would propose to care for the additional alcoholics from such a policy. The commission replied that the outlets had actually been cut over the state, but evidently they were not referring to this territory where a C license was recently granted.

John Wells, justice of the peace, in a short talk said he failed to see where the commission could promote less drinking with more places to drink and said in his capacity as an officer he had seen much suffering by families where the breadwinner spent a large portion of his earnings for beer and whiskey.



Ed Boehnke, Eugene has filed for Delegate to the Republican National Convention to be held in Chicago in July, from the Fourth Congressional District.

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Easter Seal Sales To Open March 13

The sixth annual Easter Seal sale sponsored by the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults opened in the state's 36 counties Thursday, March 13, and will continue through Easter Sunday, April 13.

Jesse Rosenbaum of LaGrande, society president, said an estimated 500,000 Oregon residents will receive Easter Seals in the mails during the next several days. This is a considerable increase over a years ago.

"We are hopeful," Rosenbaum said, "that this year's sale will be the most successful in the history of the Oregon society, since the need for assistance among the state's physically handicapped children and adults is becoming more and more apparent."

The president emphasized that returns from the sale of Easter Seals are used only to assist those persons who are not eligible for aid from any other agency, either public or private.

Increases Services

During the past year, the Easter Seal agency has increased its services to handicapped persons in many ways:

1. The agency's hospital school for crippled children in Eugene has had a capacity number of youngsters throughout the year;
2. The program for training homebound handicapped has been stepped up, and
3. Speech and hearing assistance has been given to many more youngsters than ever before.

"The aim of the society," Rosenbaum said, "is to rehabilitate physically handicapped children and adults so that they can take their places in normal day-to-day living."

The Society has aided many homebound persons to become self-sufficient for the first time in their lives. Through the sale of Easter Seals, the Organization maintains a Craft Shop for the handicapped, where articles made by these handicapped persons are sold, the profits going to them. The society also helps train the persons so they can make salable articles.
