One high school student from Lane County is going to have the opportunity to attend the United Nations General Assembly to be held in New York City in July. The delegate will be chosen by contest with one contestant from each high school. The plan is a project of the Odd Fellows of this county.

Any interested 16 or 17 year old sophomore or junior attending one of the nineteen high schools in Lane County is eligible to enter the contest.

Requirements are the preparation of a 700-800 word essay and a two to three minute speech. The candidate must be interested in the work of the United Nations and international affairs. He must be a sophomore or a junior so that he may return to school and share his experiences.

Farm Units Offered To War II Veterans

Forty-two more farm units are being offered to World War II veterans in the Columbia Basin irrigation project in Washington, the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs has disclosed. Veterans must apply before April 6, to the Bureau of Reclamation, Ephrata, Washington.

This makes 89 farm units to be opened by the federal Bureau of Reclamation in the Columbia Basin this far this year. Another 33 farms are expected to be offered about April 1.

The 42 farms in the current offering range in size from 51.8 to 115.3 irrigable acres, and in price from \$708 to \$2266. A drawing will be held shortly after the application deadline date to determine successful applicants.

Vet Extension Leader to Speak At Ag Conference

Paul V. Maris, the man who sparkplugged the 1924 agricultural conference while director of the Oregon extension service, will be one of three featured speakers at the agricultural conference March 27, 28, and 29 at Oregon State college.

The announcement was made this week by F. L. Ballard, associate director of the extension service. Maris, extension service director from 1920 to 1934, was retired recently from a position as director of the tenant purchase program, farmers home administration, Washington, D. C. He returned recently from an economic cooperation administration assignment in Europe and will leave soon after his Corvallis appearance on an agricultural mission to Iran.

Theme of his appearance will be built around "Advantages of Planning Together."

Early success with a dairy planning meeting in 1923 led to the first agricultural conference the following year. This meeting, attended by approximately 540 farmers and business men, laid the ground work for much of the state's agricultural development which has taken place during the past quarter century.

Maris will be one of three featured speakers at the conference. Remainder of the program will be built around 14 forum sessions. These will include sessions of 10 commodity committees, three rural life subgroups, and an agricultural relations committee.

Less than two years after the national legislation was passed which created the extension service, Maris became Oregon county agent January 1, 1916.

Ellsworth Files For Reelection As Congressman



Harris Ellsworth, Representative from the Fourth Congressional District of Oregon, has filed with the Secretary of State his formal declaration of candidacy for nomination and re-election.

Congressman Ellsworth, former Oregon publisher, has represented Oregon's Fourth District in Congress since 1943. The Congressman was educated in Oregon public schools and was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1922.

Ellsworth has served on several important committees of the House of Representatives including Naval Affairs, Public Lands, and four years on the powerful Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee. At the beginning of the present 82nd Congress he was elevated to the House Rules Committee. This powerful group controls the flow of legislation to the floor of the House. Ellsworth is also a member of the Republican policy committee of the House.

Late last year Ellsworth was named by Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn to be one of seven House Members and seven Senators sent to Europe by Congressional order to take part in a conference with delegates to the Council of Europe at Strasbourg, France.

Bills sponsored by Congressman Ellsworth which became law include forestry legislation, the conversion of Camp White army hospital into a domiciliary home for veterans, and the opening of O and C grant lands to mineral entry.

Pending legislation introduced during this Congress by Congressman Ellsworth include a bill to settle a jurisdictional dispute concerning the administration of certain forest lands, a bill to correct the evils in the present procedure for hiring and firing government employees, a bill calling for ratification by the Senate of agreements and contracts made with foreign governments, and a bill to authorize appropriations for access roads into government timber lands.

Since Congress is in session, Ellsworth states, he will not be able to make a personal primary election campaign, but seeks the nomination on this record of good service.
