Tailoring Class, Upholstery Course Will Start Soon

Homemakers interested in signing up for an adult tailoring class may do so now by calling the local high school, 774, and leaving their name and phone number. Those enrolling in the course may make tailored garments such as a new spring suit or coat or if desired, make-overs can be used.

Registration for the tailoring course will be open this week for those interested. Classes will be held evenings in the Homemaking department at the local high school. This course has been increasingly popular with women who work during the day but have evenings free. In enrolling for the course be sure to state which evening you prefer. A Eugene tailoring instructor will conduct the course. Details of time, place and equipment needed will be announced in further issues of the paper.

Registration is also open for those interested in an upholstery course. This will be the final upholstery class for this school year. As there are already eight names registered from previous classes, those wanting to take the course should enroll as soon as possible by calling the local high school. Because it takes two weeks for the class to be processed, date and time of the first class meeting will be announced in next week's paper.

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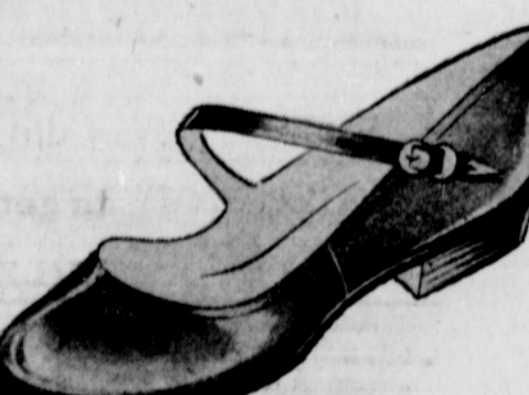
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
