Truck License Bill Would Hit Hiways

State Highway construction projects, as distinguished from Federal aid projects, have been thrown out the window of the 1952 program to the tune of approximately \$1,350,000 by the referendum filed against the truck license bill of the 1951 legislature, according to the summary of programmed construction filed by State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock at the March 13 meeting of the Commission in Portland.

Since the counties and cities also share to the amount of an additional \$650,000 from the same source, their 1952 road and street financing funds will likewise be reduced.

Bond projects and federal-aid allocations scrape the barrel so far as funds for the construction or reconstruction of roads on the 1952 strictly state highway program is concerned, at least until after the voters have handed down their verdict at the November election for or against the law now in referendum's cold storage.

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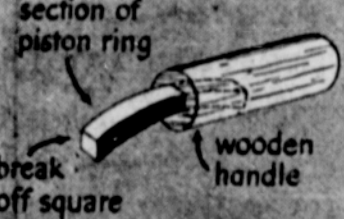
