CG Baseball Team Tops St. Francis

Cottage Grove high school baseball team defeated the St. Francis here 10-5 in its opening game played Tuesday afternoon on the high school diamond.

St. Francis got off to an early lead by scoring five runs in the first inning. The runs came as a result of five walks and two singles off the Grove pitcher, Harvey Bennett, who had trouble finding the plate.

The Saints did not score after the first inning, while the Lions kept whittling away at the score, producing single runs in each of the first two innings; two runs in the third and six runs in the sixth inning.

Ray Chapman was the leading Lion hitter, collecting two doubles and a single in four times at bat. Doyle Higdon hit a home run and a single in his four trips to the plate.

Harvey Bennett worked the first two innings having trouble only in the first, when Wes Malcolm pitched four innings of no hit-no run ball and struck out eight of the 12 batters facing him. Bill Denham pitched the final inning and faced but three batters.

Oregon has played against two of the nation's greatest pivot men during the 1952 basketball season—Bob Houbregs of Washington and Chuck Darling of Iowa.

Oregon will play a 21-game baseball schedule in 1952, including a five-game road trip to California to meet Stanford, California, Fresno and San Jose.

Lions Open Track Season With Win Over Roseburg

The Cottage Grove Lion thin clads initiated the track season here March 31st by taking a close dual meet from the Roseburg Indians 62 to 60. The junior varsity also won from Roseburg 73½ to 38½. Except for the fact that the Lions were disqualified in two events, the varsity score might have been higher.

The Lions will take a full relay team to Salem Saturday for the annual Willamette relays. Doyle Higdon in the broad jump and Ray Arthur in the javelin are the defending champions from last year.

The best results for the Lions were Wes Malcolm's pole vault of 10'11", the 19'3" broad jump of Doyle Higdon. The 44'3" shot put of Ray Arthur set a new school record. In the junior varsity event, Jess Michaels had a 42'4" shot put and Jay Wilson, freshman with a 10'1" pole vault had the best marks.

Double winners for the Lions were Higdon in the 220 yard dash and broad jump and Wes Malcolm in the pole vault and a tie in the high jump and Ken Sloan with low hurdle win and a tie in the high jump.

The Grovers showed most strength on both squads in the three jumps as they monopolized the high jump, broad jump and pole vault. Technicalities cost the Lions two first places as the relay team breezed in for a win, but the relay team was disqualified as was Gary Funk's effort in the 220 yard dash.

Asiatic Game Birds Being Raised Here For Fall Release

The Hermiston game farm is being converted for production of Chukar partridges and the game commission hopes to rear 10,000 of the Asiatic game birds for release in eastern Oregon next fall. The Hermiston game farm will rear 7,000 Chukars and the Ontario game farm 3,000 Chukars.

Introduced Chukars have proven adaptable in rough, arid regions of the west and in recent years they have provided excellent sport for Washington and Nevada hunters.

Building flocks

For the past two years the game commission has been building up a breeding flock of 1,200 Chukars, but the young birds are highly susceptible to diseases and parasites carried by the domestic hens used for brooding. Hermiston Game Farm Superintendent Roy Dickson has devised small electric brooders for the Chukars that should help overcome the disease transmittal problem. The exotic game birds will also be broken in to small groups and dispersed widely over the Hermiston game farm to prevent the spread of any disease.

A trial plant of 270 Chukars was made in Warner valley near Lakeview last October. The liberated Chukars have survived one of the severest winters on record for that area as they were observed this month by Game Agent Norman Minnick.

1952 Angling Rule Copies Available

The game commission has announced that copies of the 1952 Oregon angling regulations are now available at all game license agencies.

The commission also reminds anglers that the new salmon-steelhead punch card is now in effect; the old tag card expired March 16. When a salmon or steelhead 20 inches or more in length is caught the angler punches his card in the space provided and writes in the date and stream. Unlike the old cards, a tag does not have to be attached to the fish.

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Steelhead Spawned At Trout Hatchery

Deschutes river summer steelhead trapped on Squaw creek near Sisters are being spawned at the game commission's Wizard Falls trout hatchery on the Metolius river. These fish are from the run that provides excellent fishing during August and September in the lower reaches of the Deschutes river.

Hatcheryman Gene Morton has already spawned 33 summer steelhead and expects this week to obtain 50,000 eggs needed for the game commission's Deschutes summer steelhead production program. Over 40,000 Wizard Falls hatchery reared summer steelhead, progeny of fish trapped last year at Squaw creek, will soon be liberated in the Metolius river and lower Squaw creek.

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
