Beulah Farber Reports on Seminar, United Nations at District Meet

Mrs. Beulah Farber of Central Point, Oregon Conference secretary for the Wesleyan Service Guilds, who just returned Saturday from the "Issues of Peace Seminar" in New York and Washington, D. C., was guest speaker Sunday, at the southern district conference of Wesleyan Service Guilds held at the Cottage Grove Methodist church.

Mrs. Farber brought back valuable information from this seminar and shared her experiences with the four Wesleyan Service Guilds represented.

She sat in on a United Nations meeting in trusteeship council and was impressed with the speeches by the 13 members representing the various countries.

Issues of Peace Will Effect Us
The topic "How the Issues of Peace will Effect us in 1952" was stressed in international aspects of peace, national aspects of peace and personal aspects of peace at the seminar, Roger Burgess, editor of Concern in his devotionals told the group "We have to be at peace with ourselves before we have peace in the world."

The goal of the group is working toward peace and the church people were told they have a job to do. They were also told the communists are spending millions of dollars on leadership alone in Africa and that the church people have a responsibility in sending the Word of God to Africa and other countries.

Personal Letters Powerful
She touched briefly on the meeting of the United Nations and mentioned that each representative's speech had the same weight, including the Russian delegate. It was stressed that personal letters to your own lawmakers were very powerful.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Fruit Muffins

1 1/2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 well-beaten egg
1/2 cup Per Milk
1/2 cup juice of apricots

3 Tablespoons melted shortening
1/2 cup drained, cooked, dried apricots, cut-up
4 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Sift flour, baking powder, 1/4 cup sugar and salt into bowl. Stir in quickly a mixture of egg, milk, juice and shortening. Fold in apricots. Put into 12 greased muffin cups filling about 3/4 full. Sprinkle tops with mixture of 4 teaspoons sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400) 20 minutes, or until brown. Serve warm.

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
