Peak of Prune Thrips Is Here

The peak of prune thrips emergence has arrived, the County Extension Office reported Thursday, and orchardmen should check their fruit blossoms for infestations.

Thrips are tiny, pencil-shaped insects which feed on prune, pear and cherry blossoms, causing the buds to blast. If more than two or three of them are found per bud, the trees should be dusted or sprayed with DDT preparations.

Spray formulas and further information may be obtained from the County Extension Office in the Public Market Bldg., Eugene.

cent limitation was anticipated. Joe Bricher, councilman, asked an opinion on the 1 per cent issue of Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the league. Allen said Kehrl told Bricher that Cottage Grove was one of the few remaining cities if not the last one to keep the limitation. He said most cities did away with it long ago. He also told the Cottage Grove delegation that the state law of the 6 per cent limitation superseded the 1 per cent limitation anyway.

Attending the meeting besides Allen and Bricher were Mayor F. H. Doleman, City Engineer L. W. Coiner and Councilman Richard Thwing.

Councilmen and budget committee members voted not to do away with the 1 per cent limitation at recent sessions when the budget was approved. As a result salary raise requests were denied as well as other items cut.

Water Rates

Water rates were raised by councilmen at their last session, but the citizens have not yet had a chance to vote a bond issue for the new water system. A \$400,000 bond issue was passed in 1950 for the proposed sewer system, construction of which is underway now. Construction of a sewage disposal plant may get underway this summer following sale of some of the bonds.
