a measure on the ballot at the primary election that would amend the charter and do away with the limitation.

"We are hobbling along on the theory of the 1 per cent limitation while the community is growing," one councilman said.

Councilmen finally decided that the issue of the amendment might be put on the November ballot. The high school also will add one teacher. The idea of a full-time nurse to divide her time between grade and high schools at a cost of \$3,000 was turned down by budget boards of both schools. A part-time nurse only is on duty now.

Other increases in the school budget allowed for rises in price of supplies. Also a raise from \$1,500 to \$6,000 was made for repair, maintenance and replacement of furniture and equipment. Virgil Kingsley, superintendent, said that rooms and hallways needed painting and renovating and plans were to install automatic heat control units in all rooms.

The school bus fund was lowered from \$12,000 to \$5,000 as no new buses are now needed. The \$5,000 item is in a bus reserve fund. Receipts for the district were not estimated as high due to the amount of basic school support money being lower than expected last year.

"Support is based on need instead of valuation," Kingsley said. A total of \$58,000 in basic school support is budgeted.

So far as schools are concerned, taxes are lower. The city budget makes the larger raise.

Dr. D. A. Morris Tells Lions Club Blood Plasma Saves 50% Battle Casualties

Lions club members Thursday heard some European pre-war experiences of Dr. D. A. Morris, local surgeon. Dr. Morris attended a German university during the time Hitler was on the march in 1936 and 1937.

His experiences were heightened by the fact that he inherited a motorcycle shortly after enrolling in the university, and his curiosity to see some of the European countryside got him into frequent trouble with the law. In fact part of his residence there was spent in jail, he said.

Hits Tank Trap

He took a side road which led him to a German tank trap and into trouble with the armed guards stationed around the tank trap. On another occasion he said he was arrested after leaving a hotel at 3 a.m. and after he had the misfortune to have a tire blow out. In most of his troubles, he stated, officers immediately accused him of having a fake passport, but in all cases Dr. Morris was able to talk himself out of trouble.

He said he did not think much of the morale of the French soldiers at this time and said they were poorly dressed, their uniforms never seeming to fit. Apparently they were more interested in chasing the women than in preparing to fight a war that eventually came, he stated. They seemed to feel safe behind the Maginot line.
