Many New Hybrid  
Fabrics Added  
To Age Old Fibers

"Hybrid" fabrics are revolutionizing textiles, reports Miss Lucy Lane, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college.

For thousands of years, she points out, the world got along with four textiles—cotton, linen, silk and wool. Now within a 50 year span, the consumer is suddenly faced with some two dozen kinds of man-made fibers. Seventy or more are still under production.

In the new hybrid fabrics, the best characteristics of natural and man-made fibers are combined to produce materials that meet special needs.

One such blend is 45 percent wool and 55 percent orlon. Wool has many fine qualities but its shrinkage in washings have never been completely controlled. The

chief assets of orlon are easy washing and quick drying, so a mating of these fibers results in a washable fabric.

Another blend is 55 percent wool, 12 1/2 percent nylon, and 32 1/2 percent vicara. This fabric inherits the warm resiliency of wool, the strength of nylon, and the cashmere feel of vicara.

A still different blend; 45 percent worsted and 55 percent dacron, produces a hard-finish fabric which holds its shape well and is even more crease-resistant.

These and many other fabrics are now on the market, some in yardage and others available in ready-to-wear.

But new developments bring new problems, too. Miss Lane cautions homemakers to trade with reliable dealers and to look for labels. Without a label giving fiber content, recommended use and care, the consumer is back on the old trial-and-error basis, she warns.

Three Special  
County Issues  
To Be on Ballot

Three special county issues will be on the ballots in the Lane county primary May 16. Two of the issues will be placed on the ballot as results of petition campaigns. The third issue is a proposal of the court itself.

If voters approve the measures, Lane county would probably be the first county in the state to adopt the county manager plan, replacing the three man commissioner's court with a seven member council, who would be empowered to employ a county manager.

The second issue would empower the county court to levy up to 6 of a mill tax outside the six per cent limitation for a period of four years. This would continue to finance the county garbage disposal program.

The third proposal would establish a county-wide control over roaming livestock, restricting them to the premises of their owners. The county now has control over most of the livestock in the county, but there are a number of districts where no legal restraints are imposed and the special issue on the ballot is designed to remedy this.

The 6 of a mill levy would yield approximately \$75,000 for the garbage disposal.

NATIONAL GUARDSMEN  
GIVEN COMMISSIONS  
IN ARMY HOME STUDY

A total of 2,233 enlisted men have been commissioned as second lieutenants in the National Guard during the past 18 months as a result of having successfully completed the Army extension course program, Maj. Gen. Raymond H. Fleming, Chief of the National Guard Bureau, has announced.

Enrollment in the 10-series Army home study courses is open to all enlisted guardsmen, regardless of time in service, with approval of unit commanders. Length of time for completion depends on the individual student. However, after successfully completing the courses, candidates must meet the following requirements for appointment and Federal recognition as commissioned officers: be 21 to 28 years of age, at least one year of total service in the Armed Forces, the National Guard, or both, prior to appointment; high school graduate or equivalent; recommendation by an examining board; availability of a table of organization space.

Gen. Fleming also reported that State Officer Candidate Schools, supported by state funds, are expected to prove an increasingly important source of National Guard junior officers. Eventually it is hoped that each state and territory will have at least one school for the direct training of officer candidates.

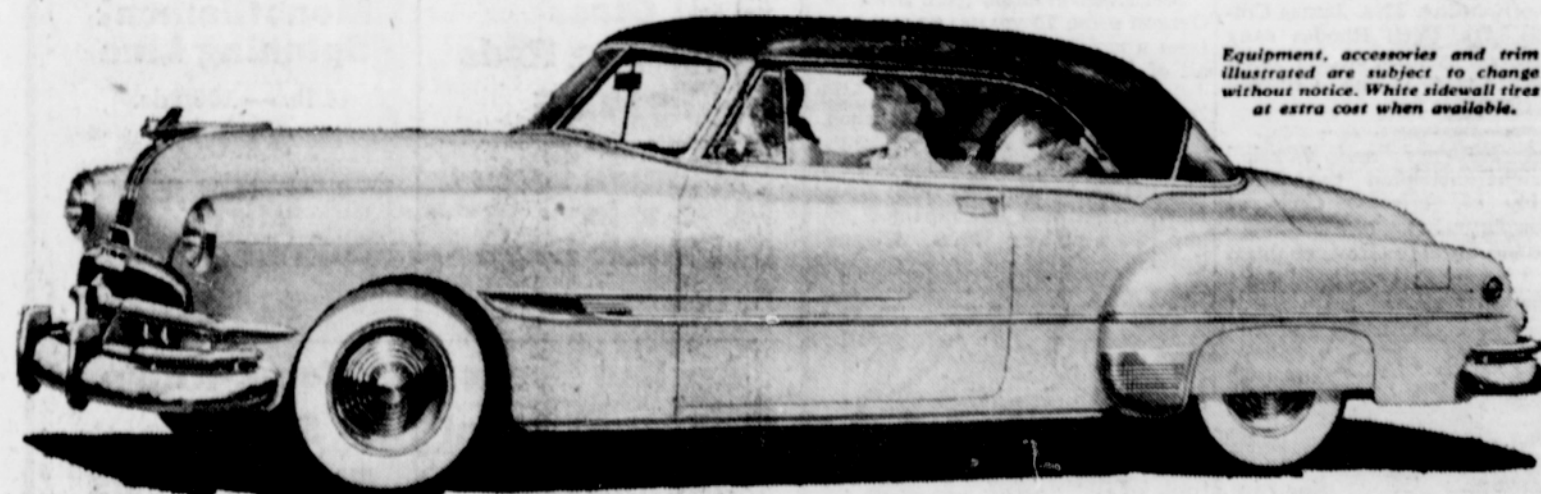
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
