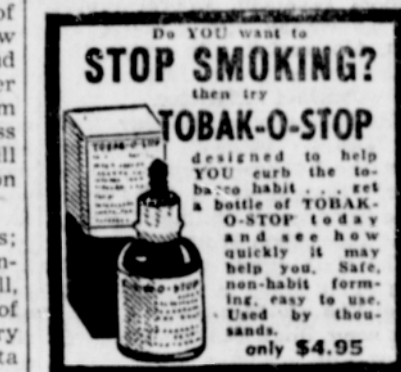
Three 25-year knights were introduced. They were J.H. Thoma, John Keibelbeck and Doc Elvin.
