Local Man Author of County Proposal For Naming 4-H Scholarship Winners

A new plan for selecting 4-H club scholarship winners is being introduced to all Lane county clubs by J. R. Gurton, county extension agent.

The plan, developed by C. J. Robinson, Silk Creek 4-H club leader, is being suggested for use within county clubs. Mr. Robinson himself has used it successfully in his work, Gurton said.

Mr. Robinson advocates that scholarship winners be chosen by their own club members rather than by outsiders through statistical methods. In previous interviews with the Silk Creek leader, Mr. Robinson has told the Sentinel that he believes this method stimulates club cooperation and interest and works for the good of the whole.

Following is the list of suggestions that have been sent out to county clubs for possible adoption.

4-H Scholarship Selection
Who can judge a 4-H club member better than the other members of the club?—a leader, a local adult committee, or total strangers?

When asked if scholarships in a club could be awarded fairly thru an election by the club members, most adults say "no," then immediately declare such a method would be simply a popularity contest.

Why this conclusion? Don't we have faith in our 4-H Club members' reasoning abilities? Or is it an admission that we leaders have not grasped the true meaning of youth leadership?

Would an election system be feasible if your club members were thoroughly briefed beforehand as to a sound basis of selection?

What's wrong with the 4-H's as a sound basis for choosing a scholarship winner?

Club members would be asked to vote by ballot for the one candidate "Who has tried the hardest to live the 4-H way."

The 4-H Way
"The 4-H Way" being exemplified by each of the 4-H's and explained by the leader.

Head "H"—"I pledge my head to clearer thinking. Who does the best planning? Who shows his reasoning power? Who shows the most interest? Who is regular in attendance?"

Heart "H"—"I pledge my heart to greater loyalty. Who has done the most for others? Who shows the greatest consideration for others? Who is kind, sympathetic and true?"

Hand "H"—"I pledge my hands to larger service. Who does the best project work? Who has made the greatest improvement in his or her work? Who makes the best use of his or her skills?"

Health "H"—"I pledge my health to better living. Who practices health habits which show respect

NATIONAL FOREST RECEIPTS CLIMB

Pacific Northwest national forest receipts for the first eight months of fiscal year 1952 climbed to 21 1/4 million, an increase of almost \$4 1/2 million over the same period the previous year, according to Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone. The fiscal year began July 1.

Topping the 19 national forests in the region is the Willamette, Eugene, Ore. which collected \$3,911,923—an increase of \$1,841,710 over the same period last year.

Accident Victims Buried in Idaho

The bodies of Mrs. Mary Lou Wolcott and her 9-month-old baby son, who were killed in an auto accident recently, were shipped to Idaho Falls, Ida., for burial. Funeral services were held there Tuesday, April 1. Mills Mortuary was in charge of local arrangements.

Mrs. Wolcott died in the Cottage Grove hospital a few hours after the accident which occurred near Yoncalla. Her son was killed instantly while her husband, Boyd Wolcott, escaped with minor injuries when their car had a head-on crash with a logging truck.

Mrs. Wolcott was born in Oklahoma, August 11, 1933, and was married at Las Vegas, Nev., July 17, 1949, to Boyd Wolcott, who survives her. She was a member of the Pentecostal church.

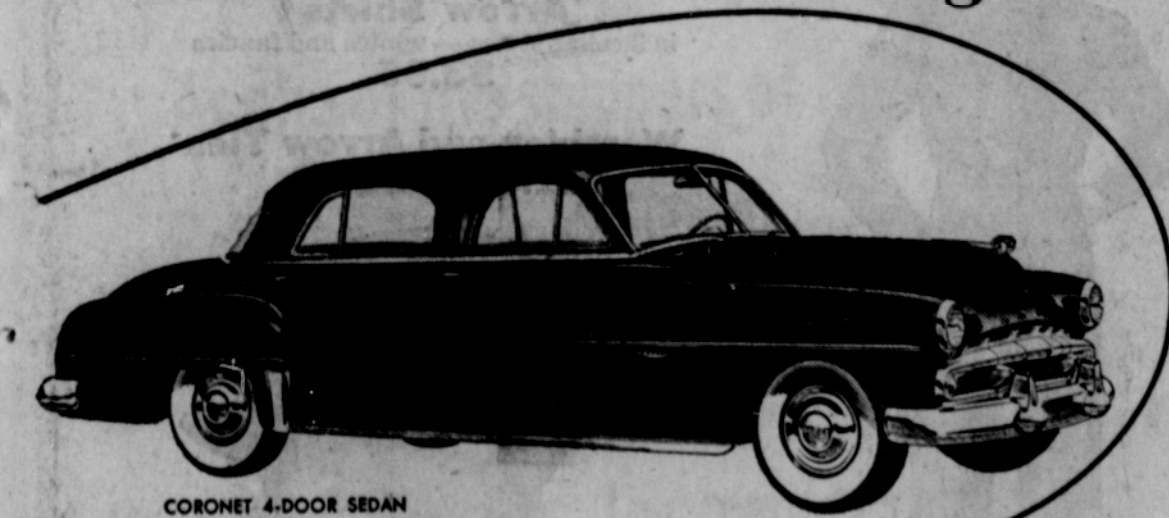
