WORLD OUTPUT OF DDT

Geneva—World production of DDT—a powerful insecticide most needed for public-health programs and agriculture—was estimated at 59,000 metric tons during 1951, according to the World Health Organization, one of U.N. specialized agencies.

Although the 1952 production forecast is estimated far above that of last year, WHO experts indicate that the demand for insecticides is increasing and that supply difficulties still exist.

NAVY WILL ACCEPT THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS

Qualified theological students between 19 and 29 years of age, will soon be recruited for appointment as ensigns in the Naval Reserve for inactive duty.

A previous regulation, requiring seminary students to be members of the Navy or Marine Corps reserve before becoming eligible for the Chaplain Corps, has been cancelled.

Applicants must have had 120 semester hours of credit in undergraduate school. Each must secure the ecclesiastical endorsement of his religious body.

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Lions Make Surprising Showing In Willamette Relays Saturday

The Cottage Grove Lion track squad made a surprising showing in the Willamette relays held at Salem Saturday. Some 1,400 high school prep stars competed in the event which saw thirteen marks fall.

Arthur of Cottage Grove copped second place in the javelin throw. The pole vault ended in a three way tie between Gray of Creswell, Malcolm of Cottage Grove and Ingram of Hillsboro for second place.

Creswell, another surprising entry, won second place in the two mile relay. The Lions copped second place in the 880 yard relay with a team composed of Higdon, Hayes, Pyatt and Wilson.

Workman of Creswell won fourth in the 440 yard dash.

In the shot put (novice) Michaels of Cottage Grove won fourth place and Smith of Cottage Grove won sixth. Wilson took second place in the broad jump and Hayes took fourth.

In the 480 yard shuttle relay a team composed of Smith, Isley, Bechtold and Sloan took 4th place.

The Lions also took seventh in the distance medley with Patton, Long, Hankins and Bechtold teaming up to make the run.

One of the interesting events of the meet was the 120 yard high hurdle. One heat in this event was won by Ken Sloan after he had lost a shoe just before reaching the last barrier.

Al Martin, former high school student, running with the Oregon Ducks helped win the two mile relay in the University class.
