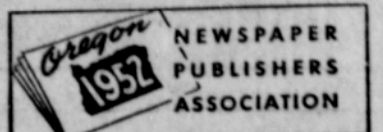

1% Limitation Outmoded

Cottage Grove is one of the few cities in Oregon with charter limitations. Most other cities dropped them on adoption of the 6 per cent constitutional limitation of the state in 1916.

This means that the city budget as far as the General Fund is concerned, must still operate on standards set by our city fathers in 1900 with no attention having been paid for years to inflation and the rising cost of living.

The charter was written for a community of 1900 and has not kept up with a community of 1952.

We wrote to Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the League of Oregon Cities, to request information about the charter limitation theory. He had already told a Cottage Grove city delegation at a session held in Eugene on March 31 that the theory of the limitation was antiquated and that Cottage Grove was the last or among the last to keep such a limitation.

The City Council and the budget committee here last month refused to go along with the suggestion of a few councilmen that an amendment to the charter doing away with the limitation be put on the May primary ballot.

The Mayor said that the people wanted the limitation as "a brake on the council's spending power." But what the good Mayor does not realize is that the people themselves put on the brake at the polls, and after all it is the 6 per cent they vote on, not the 1 per cent.

One budget committee member said he had compared salaries of our city employees with those from cities of the same size published in a League of Oregon Cities circular. But what this budget committee member did not realize was that these city employees elsewhere were also asking for cost of living wage raises.

As a result of the failure of the council and the budget group to put an amendment on the ballot, the city lost a very valuable fireman and a volunteer is replacing him.

Councilmen did say that the 1 per cent issue might be put on the November ballot. We will wait and see.

The following is from Mr. Kehrl's letter:

Prior to the adoption of the 6 per cent constitutional limitation in 1916, various city charters did contain flat millage limitations. Ordinarily, these limitations did not create any problem until the late 1930's and the period since that time.

"Assessed valuations in many cities declined during the 1930's. As a result, flat millage limitations have created problems."

"The city of Pendleton had an 11 mill limitation in its city charter. This was removed from the charter by charter amendment in May, 1947. Likewise the city of Lakeview had a 15 mill limitation. In 1944 the voters repealed this limitation."

"The position taken in Pendleton and Lakeview was that the 6 per cent constitutional limitation which was adopted in 1916 is a state wide limitation applying to all local subdivisions and makes previous limitations unnecessary."

"In a sense, it supersedes the previous limitations. It seems to me that any millage limitation is out-moded."
