Lane Green Guard To Enter Contest For Fire Posters

Lane County Green Guard members are being invited to take part in the 8th annual state-wide fire prevention poster contest sponsored each year by the Keep Oregon Green association.

The hundreds of local Green Guards, the youth auxiliary of the Keep Oregon Green association, may enter contest posters from April 15 to April 30, according to E. A. Danielson, County Keep Oregon Green chairman.

Green Guards will be divided into two divisions, Junior division including all members from 8 to 12 years of age, and the Senior division including those from 13 to 16 years.

There will be four \$5.00 cash prizes in each division. To the two division first place winners there will be a \$10.00 prize, a trip to a State Fire Warden's headquarters near the Tillamook Burn and have their cash prize presented to them by Dean Paul M. Dunn of the School of Forestry, Oregon State College, who is also Vice-President of the Keep Oregon Green Association.

The size of the poster will be 11 by 14 inches. Only one poster may be submitted by each Green Guard and must be their own work. On the back of each poster the Green Guard must print their name, address, age and school they attend. All posters will become the property of the Keep Oregon Green Association, after judging.

There are now 37,824 boys and girls enrolled in the Oregon Green Guard.

Green Guards must use a fire prevention theme and the posters will be judged on originality, relation to educational phases of fire prevention and artistic qualities. They may be in cut-outs, water colors, poster paint, oils, pastels, or wax crayons.
