With Easter over the summer season is almost at hand, with crisp cottons the byword for every smart girl and woman. Cottons this year with a more wrinkle-resistant quality, often very sheer with a glazed or iridescent look, more feminine, with fuller skirts.

Embossed cotton dusters by Sally Linn are new at PERRY'S. In gold, light pink, dark pink, aqua, with mandarin neckline. They come with belts and can be worn as a dress also. Nice for summer lounging are the gold cloth dusters, green, black and red with gold on white background. Lovely also are the heavy butler linen dusters by Kafoury, in pale blue, tan and white, also belted to be worn sometimes as a dress.

The sleeveless look is here to stay this summer. Evidence is the Carole Chris charcoal denim sports dress, with white pique trim on the sleeve and neck, big black shiny buttons down the front, black patent belt.

Gold cloth appears again in a sundress, plain top, gold splashed skirts, in several color combinations.

Of course the rage this season for teens and matrons alike are the full cotton embossed and linen skirts. The heavy linens are in plain colors of green, yellow, white and light blue. The embossed cottons in lovely splash or flower prints, rayon linens with a shiny look, two patch pockets, inverted full center pleat, in light green, brick red.

For a warm day pair the skirts with a white eyelet peasant blouse, slightly off the shoulder. Under it all a cotton slip with eyelet top and band of eyelet around the bottom. Or with a heavier nylon-linen blouse, use the cotton half slip that is so cool and comfortable, with a wide eyelet flounce on the bottom. The Palm-day! seersucker shirts in red and white also make nice tops. Or the Carol West blue and white or black and white checked pucker nylon blouse with the Gibson Girl look.

For dress, lovely yellow shirt-waist dress in Mystalon, a new name for nylon, top, Lil' Alice.

For real play, Pyke's sailcloth and denim playclothes. Pedal pushers and slacks, with white stitching as trim. In black, green

bright blue, red, yellow, charcoal and white.

Lovely, frothy graduation dresses are just in at THE SMART SHOP. Stiff, crisp organdy in white, with tiny white embroidered flowers all over the dress. In light blue and pale green, with camisole top, small straps, bolero jackets. Also nice are the Nelly Don sleeveless seersuckers, tan and white striped, for golfing or street wear. 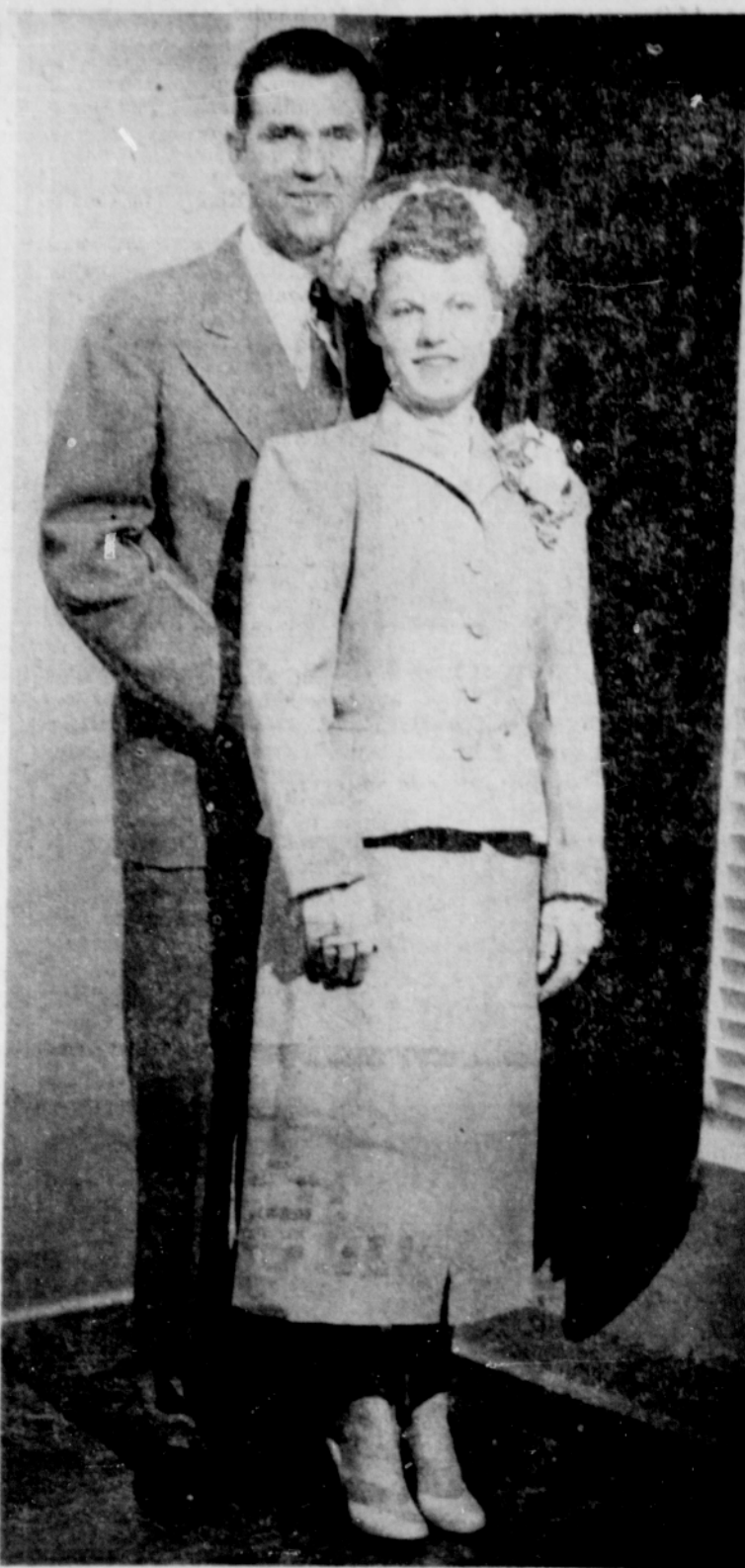
