For the Homemaker's Festival May 1st at Erb Memorial building, Miss Lucy Lane, who is the Oregon State College Extension Clothing Specialist, will bring greetings from the College to Lane County. Miss Lane has been Clothing Specialist in the Cooperative Extension program since the fall of 1938. Prior to this work she taught clothing and textiles in Kansas. Miss Lane has traveled through Central America on a Caribbean cruise.

During her sabbatical year, Miss Lane studied at the Teachers' College, Columbia, New York. While in New York Lucy Lane had a class in "Broadcasting Home Economics" at the Radio School at Radio City Center.

Miss Lane's formal schooling started with her undergraduate work taken at Baker University, Baldwin, Kansas. She did graduate work at the University of Wisconsin, University of California, and Teachers' College, Columbia. Her Masters Degree is Clothing and Textiles was taken at the University of Iowa.

Also on the program will be Wilfred Myatt, Professor of Geography at Oregon State College, who is a native-born Canadian,

and was asked to talk on travels through Canada.

Hector Smith, a graduate of the University of British Columbia, will play the bagpipes, dance and sing Canadian dances and songs.
