SAN FRANCISCO—Methodists of every state and from at least thirty overseas countries will spend two weeks, beginning April 23, in the Civic Auditorium here planning and legislating for their denomination's next four years. This will be the first time in half a century that such a body will have met in the West. In 1904 Los Angeles entertained the General Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, one of the three bodies which, in 1929, reunited to form The Methodist Church.

The Los Angeles conference is remembered for being the first in which women were accepted as delegates. In the coming session, 75 of the 360 lay-delegates will be women.

World Mission Drive Gets Underway Here

Seventh-day Adventists have launched their annual world mission appeal here. Last year's world drive, to which many local residents contributed liberally netted \$13,565,518.82 for the support of medical, educational, and other activities carried on by Adventists around the globe.

In Cottage Grove and vicinity, \$1183.71 was given, and the church seeks a similar amount from friends and neighbors this year.

The local church plans to exceed its \$1000 goal in a four-week solicitation campaign. Donald Myers heads the committee in charge of the drive.

The Seventh-day Adventist church has carried its work of mercy into 228 of the 282 officially listed countries of the world. To promote the program, the organization maintains 551 major institutions, including hospitals, schools, and publishing houses. More than 2,900 Adventist mission schools are also in operation. It requires \$19.31 to maintain this program for one minute.

Dorcas Welfare Societies, organized in nearly every Seventh-day Adventist church in North America, have collected and shipped a large share of the \$10,000,000 worth of relief supplies the church has sent abroad since the war. At home the church is setting up disaster relief centers in its church buildings and training its membership in first aid procedures in order to be ready to serve in local or national emergencies.
