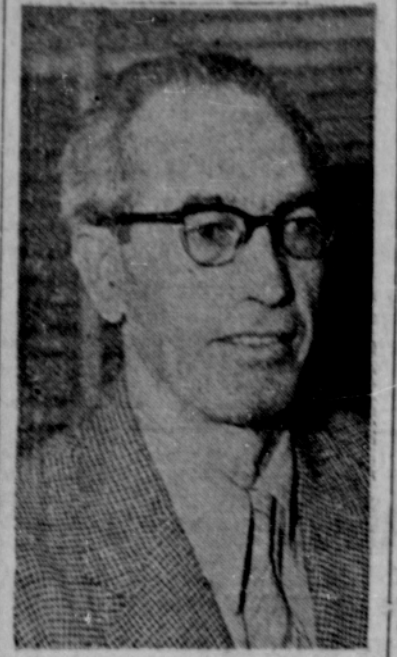

New Vision Testing Device to be Used In Driver's Exams

More thorough testing of eyes of prospective Oregon drivers' license applicants will be made possible with the use of a new vision testing machine which will be put into use in May, Secretary of State Earl T. Newby has stated.

The new testing device, the Keystone Telebinocular, will be put to use by the secretary of state's 33 drivers license examiners following their conference in Salem May 1, 2, and 3. The Telebinocular is an optical device working on the old stereoscope principle and can be used to check a license applicant's vision in four ways: vertical balance, lateral balance, fusion, and visual acuity.

Examiners can take the machine into the field with them, and give far more accurate vision examinations than with the old vision tests consisting of lettered cards on a far wall.

Chemical Plants Near Sawmills Urged By WCLA Leader for Wood Utilization

Sawmills of the future in Oregon and Washington and northern California may look like a Rube Goldberg contraption, because industry leaders are now proclaiming a new age of wood chemistry is at hand.

Hillman Lueddemann, Portland, president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, is taking the forefront in urging lumbermen to promote, encourage and finance manufacturing plants and chemical works which would use wood as a raw material.

The lumber chieftain believes chemical plants can profitably be built adjoining sawmills to use the leftover scrap, trim, edgings, shavings and sawdust. He cited an amazing variety of products which can be made from wood by application of chemical treatments.

Products Listed

Edibles for man and beast rank high on Lueddemann's list. Feeding molasses (and the region is short of protein feeds), wonder drugs, rayon, fibres, ship stores, pulp products, plastics, tannins, wax, ethyl alcohol, methanole, turpentine, lignin, explosives, and land extenders are just a few of the astounding list of goods for man which can be taken from wood.

Plants Hailed

Lueddemann hailed many new plants, almost unused, which have been built by the lumbermen in recent years and which in fact introduce the new age of wood chemistry. He said the factory at Longview which manufactures eleven valuable commercial products from Douglas fir bark is an example. Rapid expansion of plants making hardboard from waste wood is another tipoff to the future.

The lumber leader said the most encouraging news is the disclosure that this great potential wood chemical industry can get its raw products from present-day waste or sawmill leftovers. He said kraft paper mills alone, using sawmill scrap, were saving 400,000,000 feet of timber yearly and would soon be saving 700 million feet, from Oregon and Washington forests.

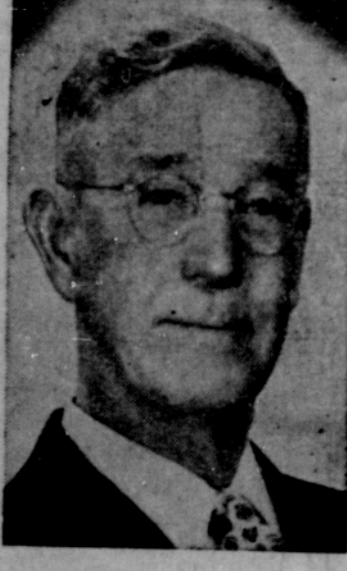
