Lumberman Urges Controls Removed In Home Building

CRESWELL—The time has come for the federal government to remove all emergency controls over home building and other construction, according to Ed Green, local lumber and building materials dealer and member of the Public Affairs committee of the National Retail Lumber Dealers association.

"Unless both credit restrictions and construction controls are removed promptly, there soon will be an over-supply of metals and other materials commonly used for building purposes," Mr. Green said.

"The latest information from Washington shows that the quantity of steel, copper, and aluminum available for use in building has been increasing steadily and there will be more than sufficient to meet normal construction requirements by the time builders will be able to get additional work under way in any volume."

"Builders and contractors also should be allowed to use any controlled materials which they have in inventory or can get on the open market so as to permit greater flexibility in construction."

"The existing controls, adopted before the materials situation began to improve, are throwing the local home building pattern out of balance by allowing only enough controlled material to build smaller homes."

"If credit restrictions also penalize those families who need and want larger homes but are not in position to make the high down payments required under the regulations now in force."

"Construction now is the only major industry whose volume is being effectively held down below demand by the controls system."

In the first frame, the Bulldogs picked up 3 runs to lead the home team 3-0. These came on a walk, a single and a bunt that set up a squeeze play. Dersham started on the mound for the Creswellites, but after two out, he loaded the bases on walks. Sam Shoaff came in from center field to put out the fire.

In the second, it was Shoaff that got into hot water as he put two men on with one away. Then the JC's found their eye as they began to bang out hits, through and over the infield. A couple of Bulldog errors also started the Tiger nine on the road to victory. Zilkoski came on to relieve Shoaff, but after pitching against the Pleasant Hill team the day before, it was too much to expect of him to be at his best. Before the dust cleared, the home lotters had crossed the plate 11 times to give them a 11-3 lead. This lead was never threatened during the rest of the game.

Merrill was relieved in the sixth by Burns, who pitched the seventh and the final inning for the Bulldogs.

It was Pollard that was credited with the win for the Tigers. Shoaff was the losing pitcher for the Bulldogs.
