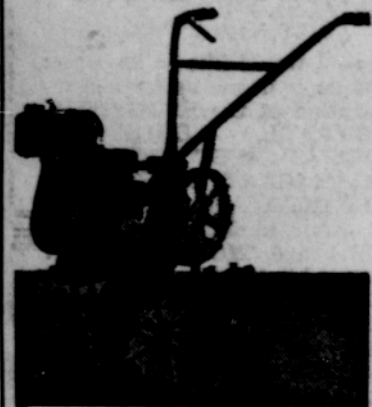

New State 4-H Home Ec Leaders Appointed by OSC

New state leaders for Oregon's 25,000 4-H club boys and girls and nearly 15,000 members of home economics extension units throughout the state were recently approved by the state board of higher education.

Burton Hutton, state 4-H agent for the past four years and a member of the Oregon State college extension staff for 12 years, will become state 4-H leader September 1. He will succeed L. J. "Doc" Allen who has submitted his resignation effective September 1. Allen has been on the OSC 4-H staff for 37 years.

Miss Frances Clinton, a member of the home economics staff for 22 years, will become state home economics extension leader October 1, succeeding Mrs. Azalea Sager. Mrs. Sager has resigned after serving the OSC extension service for 20 years.

Miss Viola Hansen, acting extension home furnishings specialist, will become assistant state home economics extension leader succeeding Miss Clinton.

Hutton has had wide experience in farm and public service work since he received his degree in agriculture from OSC in 1927. He formerly was farm service director for radio station KALE, now KPOJ, in Portland and was farm editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian and farm and city editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times.

For eight years he was farm service director of KOAC, state-owned radio station on the OSC campus. Before returning to Portland radio work, he was for several years assistant agricultural director of the Great Northern railroad with headquarters in St. Paul, Minn.

Miss Clinton joined the central extension service staff on the OSC campus in 1945 after serving as home economics extension agent in Multnomah, Umatilla and Marion counties. A native of Chehalis, Wash., she graduated from College of Puget Sound and received a masters degree from Oregon State college. She has also taken graduate work at Cornell and Columbia universities.

While on sabbatical leave last year, she visited home economics leaders throughout Europe and attended the Midcentury Conference on Children and Youth in Washington, D. C. She was recently nominated for vice president of the American Home Economics association.

Spraying Time for Walnuts, Currants And Gooseberries

Apply the first pre-bloom application of dust or spray for control of walnut blight to grafted Frankette and Mayette orchards located on the Valley floor. Several spray or dust mixtures can be used to prevent walnut blight so that the nuts will have un-

damaged kernels at harvest time. For details on the type of materials for this application and later applications, contact your county extension agent by writing to the Producers' Public Market Building, or by phoning 4-2219.

The time has arrived for spraying or dusting for control of the currant and gooseberry maggot, whose larvae stage causes wormy fruit. Follow this first application with further control measures at seven to ten day intervals until harvest. For detailed information, contact your county extension agent.

Spittlebugs are now doing damage in strawberry and flower beds. Apply, when these bugs are found, control methods so that the spittlebug will not devastate the plants by sucking juices from leaves, flower parts, or fruit, whichever the case may be. Methoxychlor or rotenone can be used for control.

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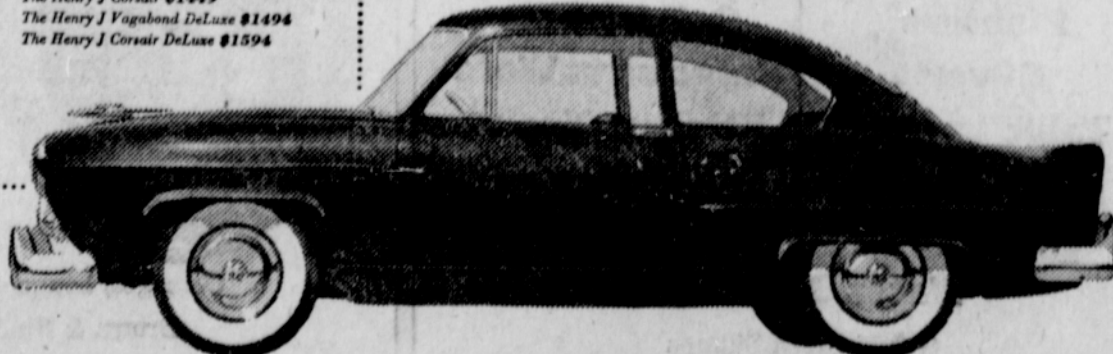
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
