Sealed proposals for the construction of a Sewage Treatment Plant addressed to the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, will be received at the office of the City Recorder, Cottage Grove, Oregon, until 8:00 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, or 8:00 p.m., Pacific Daylight Time, whichever time is in effect, on the 19th day of May, 1932, and then will be publicly opened and read.

The work contemplated consists of the construction of a Sewage Treatment Plant to provide primary treatment for a design flow of 1.33mgd, together with the necessary appurtenances. The work will be awarded to that bidder who, in the opinion of the City Council, will serve the best interests of the City of Cottage Grove.
