Korea Vet Serves As Guard Advisor

Jr. Sheriff League Key to Delinquency, Says GOP Candidate

Development in Lane county of a Junior Sheriff's League to combat dope peddling and juvenile delinquency was advocated by Allen L. Stephens, Republican candidate for county sheriff, in a talk to the Cottage Grove Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

Stephens, who is over six feet tall and wears a ten gallon hat, told the group at its luncheon session at the D-M that the dope traffic was moving westward and warned educators and businessmen to tell juveniles not to accept hand rolled cigarettes, which may be marijuana, or candy away from home. He said dope now was put in candy.

In advocating the sheriff's league he said he "wanted to put the Skipworth home out of business, to prevent the crime before it happened."

Stephens also advocated putting all tax collection matters now handled by the sheriff's office into the hands of the county treasurer. He also said he was in favor of passing the office's printing business around the county instead of centering it all in Eugene.
