Jerry Garvin Strikes Out 17 Batters As Jefferson Beats Yoncalla 13-9; Cub Track Teams Lose to Roseburg

Jefferson's star pitcher Jerry Garvin performed another feat Tuesday in the Yoncalla baseball game by striking out 17 of the 21 players that came to bat. The Cubs won the game 13-9, making it seven in a row.

The Cubs got 13 runs off of only 5 hits, with the Yoncalla team getting 9 runs from 6 hits. Some of the Cubs' runs were from walks. Lunau and Duley of the Cubs got 2 for 2, with Garvin getting 1.

The Cubs runs were as follows: 7 in the second; 2 in the third; 2 in the fourth and 1 each in the fifth and sixth. Yoncalla got 2 runs

in the first, second and third innings, and 3 in the fourth.

Jefferson's track team lost heavily to Roseburg in a meet held there Tuesday partly because some of the players were at Yoncalla for the baseball game.

Also, according to Coach Ardis Warren, several hard events were bunched up at the start of the meet, with the 880 following the 150 yard dash.

Two meets were held, one with eighth graders and the other with seventh graders. The first was Roseburg 68, Cottage Grove 27. The second Roseburg 66½, Cottage Grove 28½.

Stewart In Second

Greg Stewart, eighth grader, had to run in both the 150 yard dash and the 880, coming in second in both events. First events won by the eighth grade team included Stewart in the board jump, distance 15'1".

Eighth grade Cubs placing third were Heck in the 75 yard dash; Miller in the 440.

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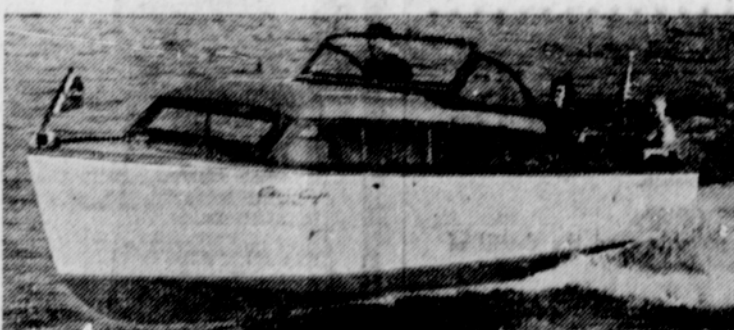
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
