**NEW HIGH IS REACHED IN TRAFFIC MISHAPS**

Another new high in traffic accidents took place in Oregon last year as reports of 75,147 motor vehicle mishaps were received by state traffic authorities, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported today.

Accidents totaled 74,106 in 1950. Since 1943, sixty new pine tree farms, embracing a total of 777,780 acres, have been established in Oregon.
