CRESWELL—The city budget of \$7,344.88 was approved at the budget election Monday evening at the city hall and also the water department budget of \$10,260. At regular session the council also voted to have Creswell remain on standard time.

The problem of renters leaving town owing for the use of the city water was discussed, and the council voted to have property owners liable for the payment of the water rent. C. R. Mourer was granted a permit for the building of a two bedroom house at the corner of A and Second streets. Clean-up days were set for May 17 and 19.

CRESWELL—The Mohawk Indians, smarting from a previous defeat by the Bulldogs, came back in the second game played at Mohawk May 2 to defeat Creswell 1-0. The games were scoreless until the sixth.

Creswell took to the plate in the first, but also went down in order as the first three went out via the fly route and infield. Then Mohawk came to the plate to face Zilkoski, but they also went out in order.

The Bulldogs put men on third and second in the second frame, but with two out Wilks, the Indian pitcher, struck out the batter. Mohawk did not get a man past the second sack. In the fourth, the squeeze play was flashed with Zilkoski on third and Burns at the plate. As it was, Burns did not lay the ball down as he should have, and the scoring threat was past as Zilkoski was put out on Burns' error.

Mohawks' run came after the third sacker clouted a long triple. Then Lindsay laid down a bunt just to the left of the pitcher's mound as Zilkoski could not reach it. Burns came in on it, but could not find a handle on it and bobbled it as the run scored and missed the man at first by a debatable call.

Creswell's last chance for score came in the top of the seventh with a man on third with one out, but the next man was called out, and the same with the last batter, thus the game ended with the Indians on top of a 1-0 score.

Wilks was the winning pitcher. Zilkoski took the loss. Shoaff led hitting with 2 for 3, but it came at the wrong time for the Bulldogs.

This was the Bulldogs second loss in eight games. They are to play the winner of the Western Division for the county championship, but no place has been set as yet. It is to be played Wednesday, May 7.
