

U.N. HELPS THE PEOPLE TO HELP THEMSELVES



IN MANY lands people improve their education and learn more about their fellowmen through the efforts of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco).

DESPITE THE RAPID advance of technology during the past two or three centuries, much less than half of the world's population are enjoying the material and social benefits created by the application of modern scientific techniques in industry, agriculture, public administration, health and related fields. The rest of the world's inhabitants—more than one and a half billion people—continue to live as they did centuries ago, many of them in need of the bare necessities of life.

Well aware of this situation, the United Nations has launched a program of technical assistance to aid in the economic development of underdeveloped countries. In cooperation with its related agencies U.N. today has aided a total of 70 countries and territories providing them with experts on matters ranging from tax administration to cottage industries, from how to take a census to tapping underground water in the desert. In addition, a total of about 1000 international fellowships and scholarships have been approved in the fields of economic development, public administration and social welfare.

U.N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie has said that, apart from the urgent political

questions, there is perhaps no area of the work of the United Nations that should attract more support than its technical assistance program. "The fundamental thesis of this program is to help people to help themselves, by introducing them to skills and organizational techniques necessary for the most effective economic use of their own resources, personnel and traditions."

This is the purpose of technical assistance, the job of making scientific knowledge, technological skill and operational "know how" available to countries needing them. This is not by any means all the help that is needed for backward countries to develop their economies, but it is a vital factor, a factor that is needed at all stages of economic development from a survey of the possibilities to the actual building of a power plant.

Through its many organs and specialized agencies, U.N. works in many directions to make the world a better place to live. The illustrations on this page offer only a few examples of what the world organization is doing. The results may well be the beginning of a new memorable phase in the social and economic history of mankind.

Republicans— Don't Send a "Chain Gang" to the National Convention!

Power-hungry politicians, seeking to control the Oregon delegation to the National Republican Convention, are throwing the full force of their machine into attacking the eight so-called "petition" delegates.

The fact is that these delegates filed under provisions of the law designed to protect the public under just such conditions as we have in the state of Oregon today.

PETITION METHOD PROTECTS THE PEOPLE

The Oregon Direct Primary law under which these eight delegates filed by petition, seeking election as free delegates, not under control of the state political machine was initiated by the people and adopted in June, 1904 by an overwhelming vote.

In 1915, the state legislature amended the original law to provide an "additional method" for selecting delegates without in any way supplanting or disturbing the traditional and time-honored method of filing by petition.

In 1916 this amendment was carried to the State Supreme Court which ruled that the amendment "afforded another method (additional to the petition method) for candidates to get before the voter," leaving the original petition method unchanged and intact.

PROTECTS AGAINST MACHINE POLITICS

In 1939, the legislature passed a law taking from the people the privilege of naming their own delegates to the national conventions. The law was referred to the people who rejected it, choosing to leave both the petition method and the declaratory method on the statute books.

The petition method of filing is therefore a valid law for the specific purpose of protecting the public against machine politics such as we have in the state today.
