Women's Choral Club of Eugene Concert May 13

Women's Choral club of Eugene will present its annual spring concert at MacArthur Court, University of Oregon campus, Tuesday night, May 13, at 8 p.m. The group is directed by Donald Alton and accompanied by Marjorie Seibert Wilson. Guest soloist will be Walter Martin, outstanding University of Oregon baritone.

This concert will be in the form of a memorial to the late Maud Densmore, who for 18 years served as chairman and chief inspiration of the club. Proceeds will be added to the present Maud Densmore Memorial Fund to be used to establish a permanent endowment scholarship to be given to an advanced student in the University of Oregon school of music at a low rate of interest.

This is a pioneer project—as few such scholarships are available to music students in the Northwest. Gifts, either from organizations or individuals, would be most welcome to help build the fund as rapidly as possible.

This scholarship is not to be confused with the high school scholarship which provides tuition for musical study for one year at the University of Oregon to a graduating senior from any Lane county high school. This competition is now in progress and the presentation will be made at the spring concert.

The choral club is composed of about 85 women from Eugene and neighboring towns. The concert program is varied—including an appealing group of negro spirituals, works of Brahms and Johann Franck, as well as selections from the more popular composers such as Rachmaninoff and Friml.
