There will be children's church immediately following dismissal from school at 3:35 p.m. starting today, Monday throughout the week, all children are welcome to attend.

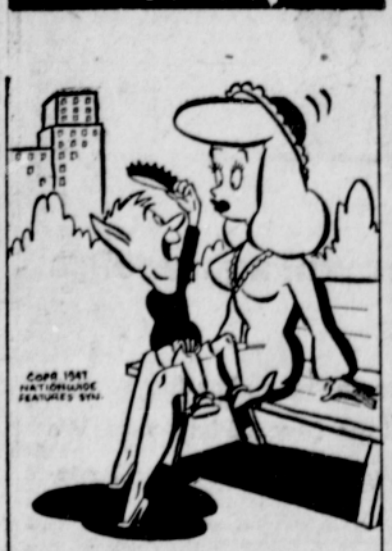

COMMISSIONS AVAILABLE IN ARMY FINANCE CORPS

Eligible persons are warrant officers and enlisted men of both the reserve corps and those presently on active duty. Civilians with or without prior military service may also apply.

UN AGENCY TO SET UP AVIATION SCHOOL FOR INDONESIANS

Djakarta—The Republic of Indonesia plans to organize and operate a national aviation college with the help of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), one of the U.N. Specialized agencies.

The purpose of the college is to train Indonesian nationals as air and ground crews to operate airline services. Work has already begun here, and a disused airport built during the Japanese occupation of Indonesia is now being put into shape.

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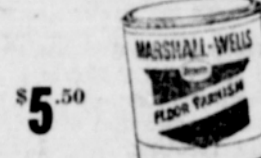
