11,000,000 CARE PACKS SENT BY OREGONIANS

Residents of Oregon contributed \$755,399.04 toward the \$125 million total in food and other supplies delivered overseas through CARE in the last six years, it has been announced by Rev. Gilbert B. Christian, CARE Oregon director.

The Rev. Mr. Christian's CARE anniversary report discloses that between Mar. 1, 1946, when the non-profit, government approved service agency began deliveries, and December 31, 1951, Americans ordered 11,000,000 CARE packages for needy people in Europe, the Near East and Asia.

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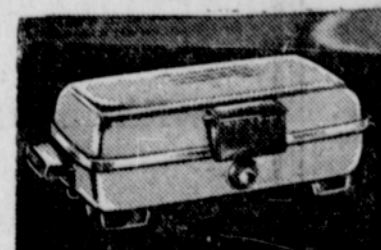


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
