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## Jobs Embrace Four Douglas County Areas

The State Highway Commission program of relocation of Highway 99 is well under way in four sections of the county and further contracts are expected to be let shortly.

The newest addition to the commission's project of rebuilding most of the 100 miles of highway in Douglas county is a stretch north of Oakland.

The work is being done by the McNutt Construction Co. and is expected to be completed by the summer of 1953.

Other sections of the county being completed include the Divide-Anlauf section north of Drain, a section through Canyonville, and another south of Canyonville. Surfacing of the two southern sections is expected to be completed this summer, the highway commission said.

A fifth program in the county just begun is the Lone Rock Bridge-to-Rock Creek section of the North Umpqua highway. On Highway 42, widening and resurfacing work extending from Winston to Suicide Creek is expected to be completed next fall.

Contract for improvement of Highway 225 from Sutherlin west to where work left off three years ago will be let this summer, the commission said.

Contract for a portion of the highway extending south of Anlauf is also expected to be let this summer, as well as a contract for another portion from north of Oakland to south of Sutherlin.

Other sections of the commission's new highway program are in preliminary stages.

The portion extending through Roseburg is being held up because of a shortage of steel for bridges.

Agreements between the Douglas County Court and the highway commission have been filed, allowing the county to take over a portion of the Chenoweth Park-Oakland Junction section of the old highway when the new one is completed.

Another agreement was filed providing for an access road to the Roseburg airport.
