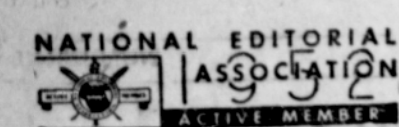

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Budget Group Seeks Support

A combined budget committee and council met last Thursday night and decided to resubmit the same budget June 6 that was recently defeated by the people. In doing this the group asked the cooperation of the local press in presenting the issues fairly and squarely to the people.

The local press answers this request by saying it is willing to stand behind the budget, if it can get assurance from the council that the 1 per cent amendment will at least be put to a vote of the people at the general election next November.

Council at a special session Monday, May 12, voted unanimously to put the measure on the November ballot. To those who still do not understand the 1 per cent problem, it is as follows:

According to the old charter the taxes to be raised for the general fund cannot exceed 1 per cent of the assessed valuation. In spite of the fact that valuations have increased each year since World War II they are still not enough to take care of general fund needs. This means that every year the council and budget group will be faced with inflation and the budget. (This is provided, of course, that inflation remains. It has been with us for some time.)

This means that salaries and funds for equipment for part of the city, including the fire and police departments and the office cannot be raised. This means that since these cannot be raised of course salaries of employees that come from other funds cannot be raised either, because of inequities that would result.

And if present inflationary trends continue, this means that the city stands static trying to run on limited funds, while prices continue to remain high or even rise and while employees in industry and the professions get wage raises. It also means that the city has to compete with raises given city employees elsewhere.

We realize and the Mayor has decried the stress put on the wage raise issue. The issue is in actuality not the wage raise but the 1 per cent limitation, called OUTMODED by the League of Oregon Cities. The 6 per cent limitation put on by the state supersedes any local limitations anyway. Cottage Grove is one of the few if not the last city in Oregon to retain such a limitation.

The budget committee and council gave other reasons for the budget being defeated. These included the \$10,000 put in the bridge fund that threw the amount over the 6 per cent limitation that much more than last year. Others said people will not vote for anything that means more taxes. And the group agreed it should have been put on the primary where a big vote would have been tallied.

In answer to the first, the bridge has been called very dangerous by the city engineer. A logging truck went thru it some time ago and supports were constructed to the bridge. The city attorney said some day a lawsuit might result against the city for anything that might happen on the bridge.

Some committee members believed that a bond issue should be floated for the bridge, thus lowering the budget.

As for the people not wishing to vote for anything that increases taxes, this is good reasoning. However, in times of inflation things keep going up. The budget committee chairman said one prominent man in town told him he would not vote for a budget that means more taxes. One councilman asked if this man were a merchant. The chairman said yes. Then the councilman asked if he had lowered the price of his merchandise. Of course, the answer is no.

May we reiterate that we are very willing to help pass a budget. The city has to have money by July 1 to run its business. We will support the budget now, and we will support the amendment in November. (JHG)

Light Vote

So far this season at the time of many elections, only about ten per cent of the eligible voters have exercised their franchise. Perhaps the fact that we have had numerous elections has been a bit confusing to many, yet there have been and will be important issues at stake. The city budget would undoubtedly have fared better had a normal vote turned out. In one or two other instances the vote was extremely light and lead one member of a budget board to observe that the voters did not seem to care how much the board members spent or plan to spend.

At any rate a minority can rule wherever there is a light vote or wherever the voter refuses to exercise his right. We hope the forthcoming primary will be an exception to the small interest evidenced thus far.

Belcher Trial

Expert witness for the prosecution, Dr. Homer Harris, head of the Oregon State Crime Laboratory and assistant professor of pathology at the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland, described the post mortem he performed April 5 and discussed the bullet wound. He said the bullet could have caused death very quickly because of its angle of penetration. The bullet which caused death and a picture taken at the post mortem showing the bullet hole were placed in evidence by District Attorney Luckey.

Further testimony as to powder burns and verification of Mary Ellen's outer jacket were given by Dr. Harris. Upon cross-examination, he revealed that tests indicated the shot was fired between 18 inches and 3 feet from Mary Ellen's back, where the bullet entered.

Testimony concerning the .22 calibre Colt automatic pistol found in the Belcher home early Sunday, April 6, was given by Officers William Trout and Charles Sanders of the Oregon state police department, and Lt. Jack Biers of the Oregon Crime Laboratory. Officer Trout stated that Mr. Belcher gave him the pistol for examination about 2 a. m. Sunday along with a clip of ammunition. Trout turned the pistol and am-

munition over to Officer Sanders, who in turn took it to Lt. Biers in Portland for Tests. Lt. Biers testified that some 50 bullets fired from the pistol in careful tests had the same markings as the bullet which killed Mary Ellen. A picture showing sections of such bullets under a microscope was admitted as evidence over objections by the defense attorneys.

Additional evidence in the form of a .22 calibre cartridge shell, found 15 feet from the murder scene, was placed before the court by the prosecution. Russell Arne, Lane county deputy sheriff, described the search of the grounds around the Campbell home the day following the discovery of the shell. He and several police officers combed the area April 5 and found the shell. Two shells of the same calibre were found, Arne admitted upon cross-examination. He said the second was rusted and old, while the first had been recently fired. The shell matched the bullet which killed the Campbell girl, according to the testimony.

The young defendant appeared calm during the testimony and much interested in the evidence placed before the court. Belcher is charged with first degree murder in the shooting of the Campbell girl. The defense made a surprise move in their opening statement Tuesday morning by accusing Mary Ellen's grandfather of the shooting. Belcher has pled "not guilty."

ORDINANCE NO. 1383
AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN INCREASED TAX LEVY OF \$41,805.70 OVER THE AMOUNT LIMITED BY SECTION 11 ARTICLE XI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, OREGON, FOR THE ENSUING FISCAL PERIOD JULY 1, 1952 TO JUNE 30, 1953.

WHEREAS, The Budget of the City of Cottage Grove, as prepared by the Budget Committee, for the ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1952, to June 30, 1953, calls for a tax levy as follows, to-wit:

Total levy all funds 76,704.92
Less Principal and Interest Bonds 10,000.00

Within 6% Limitation 66,704.92

Outside 6% Limitation \$41,805.70

against all of the taxable property within the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, for the purpose of deriving funds necessary to carry on the different departments and meet the expenses of the City Government of said City and create sinking funds for the various outstanding bonds and obligations of said City, and the amount of tax necessary for said purpose in excess of the six per cent (6%) limitation proposed to be levied for ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1952, to June 30, 1953, is \$41,805.70.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, DO ORDAIN:

Section 1: That the annual levy of taxes for the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, for the ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1952 to June 30, 1953, be increased \$41,805.70 over the amount limited by Section 11 Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, based upon the highest tax levy within the last three years plus six per cent (6%), amounting to \$24,899.22 and the said amount of \$41,805.70 being in excess of the six per cent (6%) limitation aforesaid, being necessary in order to derive funds to carry on the different departments of said City and to meet the expenses of the Government of said City, caused by the increased cost of labor and material, and to provide further and additional funds for street construction and repairs and for an increased amount for library fund and for other necessary expenses.

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Ministers' Group Sponsors War Film On Korea May 20th

A tender narrative is woven in and out of the Korean missionary film, "The Flame," to be presented at 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 20 at the high school auditorium. The local presentation is sponsored by the Ministerial association.

Sequel to the missionary film that made motion picture history, "38th Parallel," which was filmed at the outset of current hostilities, "The Flame" shows Korea actually at war and, in gripping front-line combat scenes and behind-the-lines devastation reports, brings the war directly home where all can witness the suffering and tragedy lying in its wake.

Dr. Bob Pierce, missionary-statesman extraordinaire, was accredited a United Nations War correspondent and in this capacity was privileged to record scenes normally denied average cameramen overseas. "The Flame" contains some of the finest and most unusual pictures received from the war to date.

Korea Poverty Shown
The narrative woven in and out of the record is the story of Lynne Ryder, whose husband Pierce has met overseas. About to have a baby, Lynne becomes realistically aware of the many luxuries that are hers as Pierce describes the poverty and degradation in Korea, graphically portrayed on the screen in flashback scenes filmed by Pierce personally.

Theme of the story is taken from the Biblical passage found in the Gospel of John about the light shining in darkness and the darkness unable to put it out. Pastor Im, a Christian minister, undergoes prolonged suffering as a prisoner of war in the hand of first the Communists and later allied forces. His faith in God continues, however, and his testimony results in Bible schools being established in many of the Communist Prisoner of War Camps. Pierce and his camera take you directly into several of these camps where thousands of Communists are seen attending evangelistic meetings.
