Lions Place 2d in District Track Meet; Relay Team, Sloan Enter State Tourney

Cottage Grove Lions came out second in the district meet held Friday at Hayward Field in Eugene, with the local relay team clocking a surprise win over Eugene in the 880. The Axemen won the district 4 crown with 93 points, with the Lions tallying 63. Pleasant Hill won the "B" crown with a big score of 142 1/5 points. Creswell was third with 42.

The Cottage Grove relay team of Doyle Higdon, Jim Wilson, Dick Hankins and Marvin Hayes also scored a new school record and best time in the area this year by clocking 1:35.1 in the 880. Axemen anchor man, Romig, nearly reached Hayes in the stretch but the Grove runner held on to win by three yards. The Relay team will compete in state finals Friday and Saturday at Corvallis.

Also to go to the state meet will be Sloan, who came in second in the high hurdles. The event was won by Dick Jensen of Eugene, Time, 16.0.

Only first and second winners will compete in the state meet.

Duck Trackmen Prepare for N. D. Title Bid May 17

University of Oregon, Eugene—Coach Bill Bowerman's Oregon track squad opens its final week of practice on Monday for the Northern Division championships at Seattle on May 17 and two vexing problems face the Duck head man.

The Webfoots, weak in the field events all season, may be without two additional men when they make their bid for the division title at Seattle. Don McClure, one of the better broad jumpers in the loop, is still troubled with a bad leg which may sideline him for the third straight week.

In the high jump Emery Barnes has improved tremendously and it appeared certain that he would be a point winner until last week when the lanky Portlander's draft board sent him a summons. Barnes may be allowed to finish spring term, but if he isn't the Ducks will have suffered a severe blow to their championship hopes.

Reports Success

Elsewhere Coach Bowerman had nothing but success to report. Jerry Mock has hit his top form in the sprints and could be a big help to Bill Fell, the Duck's undefeated ace. In the 440-yard dash both Ted Anderson, the sophomore from Newport, and Doug Clement, the freshman from Vancouver, B.C., have both blistered the Hayward Field oval in time trials.

Jack Hutchins, the veteran from Vancouver, B.C., has also reached his peak and last week slipped three seconds off his season's best time when he raced through the 880-yard run in only one second over the school record of 1:52.1. Al Martin, the brilliant sophomore miler from Cottage Grove who has yet to be pushed in the mile this season, kept pace by improving on his previous performances.

Chuck Missfeldt, the defending NCAA javelin champion, spent the week end at the Fresno Relays with Fell and Coach Bowerman now feels he is nearing the form which won him the national title last season.

Coach Bowerman, whose 1950 team won the league title, predicts that this year's championship can be won by Washington, Washington State or Oregon, but the Ducks must have McClure and Barnes to stay in the three-way fight.

Brain Hemorrhage Strikes New Coach

Wally Johnson, who had been picked to succeed Maurice Kreutz as Cottage Grove high school basketball and baseball coach and physical ed instructor, is now in a Portland hospital recovering from a brain hemorrhage.

The Oakridge coach was stricken earlier in the month following a sub-district runoff track meet at which he was assisting. He was rushed to the Eugene hospital and then taken to Portland.

According to Virgil Kingsley, superintendent of the high school here, he does not yet know if Johnson will be able to assume his coaching position.

Hopeful in the pole vault event did not place. Henderson, who had vaulted 8' 2" during the tryouts locally during the week went out at 7' in the meet. It was won at 7' 6".

Lions Top Axemen In League Upset

The Cottage Grove Lions baseball team, with a 5-game loss record for the season, upset the league-leading Eugene Axemen last Thursday when they shaded them 3-2 in a game at Civic Stadium.

It was the Grove's first and only 5-A-1 triumph. Wes Malcolm and Eugene's Jack Henkel tied in a fine pitching duel, with both of them surrendering two hits and one earned run. Henkel, who fanned 13, might have fared better except for the fact that Malcolm was pitching just as tough and did not allow a hit after the first inning.

Errors Cost

Costly errors put Eugene in the bind in the first inning. Lion lead-off batter, Dick Piller, was safe at first on a grounder that rolled through the first baseman. When Higdon followed with a perfect double-play ball to shortstop, Hudspeth let this one also get through. Piller moved to third and Higdon went to second. Hudspeth took the relay from the outfield and committed his second error on the same play by pegging wide to second in trying to cut down Higdon. The Grove men scored to make it 2-0.

Eugene came back to tie the count in their half of the inning. After that the Axemen never reached Malcolm for a hit or run in the final six innings. The Lions clinched the game in the second, combining two hits for the third run.

Bob Sederger started the rally by hitting a short fly behind second. After Henkel struck out, Jim Bottorff and Lowell Radway sacrificed. Ray Duer sliced a drive to right field. Buddy Wicks tried for a catch but missed. Duer got to third and Sederger came in to break the tie.

Eugene made a threat in the sixth which did not pay off. Malcolm was credited with the win, while Henkle suffered his first prep defeat.

He pointed out the fact that Lane county has the lowest county tax rate in the state and no bonded indebtedness.

Elder, in speaking of the sheriff's post, said that the present jail was disgraceful and had been called that in a grand jury report of October 6, 1950. Elder advocated better county police coverage, removal of tax collection from the sheriff's office, strengthening of youth guidance program but not absorbing it as a function of the sheriff's office, and the fighting for better prison facilities.

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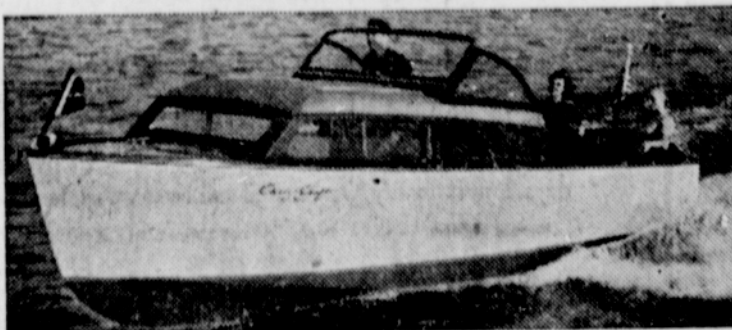
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
