Drunk Drivers Set Record for April

Drinking drivers set a 1952 record during April. Two hundred and sixty-one had driving licenses suspended after court convictions of driving while under the influence of intoxicants, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said Friday.

The figure was a high so far for the year.

License suspensions were also handed out to 47 drivers convicted of reckless driving, 20 for failure to report an accident, and eight for violation of the basic rule.

Other reasons for license suspension included: violation of license provisions, 7; narcotics addiction, 1; failure to appear for tests, 5; failure to pass tests, 5; negligent driving, 1; physical condition, 1; medical report, 7; and driving record.

Newberry also reported receipt of 3,215 traffic violation conviction reports from Oregon courts.

This was considerably lower than the March figure, when 4,271 convictions were recorded.

Information as to number of convictions is important, Newberry said, because 84 percent of all accidents involve a traffic violation on the part of one or more drivers.

Short Term License To Harvest Timber Announced by BLM

Granting of short term emergency licenses for harvesting timber in salvage areas of the Northwest has been announced by the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, as part of its coordinated program to prevent further loss of valuable timber from pest and fire hazards.

Short term permits across public lands will be granted to private operators for harvesting of privately-owned timber in clearly defined salvage situations. The Bureau, under such an emergency operation, will also accept short term grants from private land owners for the harvesting of federal timber, Roscoe E. Bell, Regional Administrator of the Northwest Region of the Bureau of Land Management, has advised from Washington, D. C.

The short term permit, good for one year, he explained, is an emergency measure and is not a change in Bureau policy that requires long term permits to be issued prior to timber sales in the O & C areas of Western Oregon. The urgency of the situation does not allow time for normal negotiations required to consummate detailed long term timber agreements, he added.

Al Rosenthal returned Tuesday from Sacred Heart hospital after more than a week's stay. He underwent surgery on May 8.

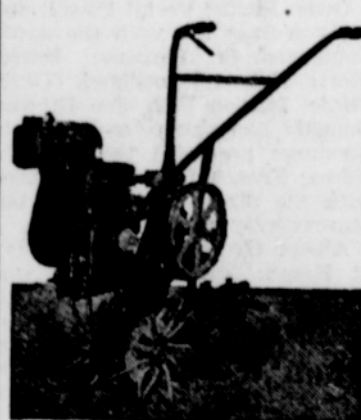

OLD AGE INSURANCE PAYMENTS IN OREGON NEAR \$2 MILLION MONTHLY

Monthly payments of \$1,966,013 under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance program were going to 55,753 people in the State of Oregon at the end of 1951. The number of beneficiaries increased by 11,753 since December 31, 1950. Monthly payments during this period rose \$345,013.

In releasing this statement F. W. Hunter, regional director for the Federal Security Agency with headquarters in San Francisco, added that total payments for the entire year 1951 in Oregon amounted to \$24,641,000, or \$11,395,000 more than for 1950. In the entire nation, benefit payments for 1951 totaled \$1.9 billion.

49 Timber Parcels On BLM May Sales

The Bureau of Land Management will offer 49 parcels of O&C timber with a total of 118,157,000 board feet of saw log size and 62,751 lineal feet of Douglas fir and western red cedar poles valued at \$2,353,688.45 during May, Roscoe E. Bell, Regional Chief of the Bureau, has reported at Portland.

Bell said that the sales will be held at the offices of the BLM district foresters. The first two sales of the month will be on May 29. On that date the district forester at Medford will offer 23,800,000 bd. ft. in eight tracts. The Salem district will offer ten tracts with a volume of 34,600,000 bd. ft. on the same day.

Roseburg Sale
On May 21 the sale will be at Roseburg where 31,531,000 bd. ft. and 6,400 lineal feet of poles will be put up in eleven tracts.

May 22 the Coos Bay office will offer ten tracts with 16,908,000 bd. ft. and 51,085 lineal feet of poles.

May 23 the Eugene district forester will place ten tracts on the market with 11,318,000 bd. ft. and 2,263 lineal ft. of poles.
