(Continued from page 1) tlement included a 7½ cent hourly pay raise retroactive to April 1 for those on the payroll at that time. The raise is subject to approval of the Wage Stabilization Board.

Workers were also given three more paid holidays, a 2-cent increase in night shift differentials, and improved vacation program. Logging "hoot owl" shift workers shall receive an additional 6 cents an hour.

Vacation Clause

The vacation clause was revised so that an employee with three or more years of continuous employment before April 1 of the year in which the vacation is taken is eligible for two weeks vacation with 10 days pay, if he has worked 1400 hours during the vacation base year. Those working not less than 1120 hours shall receive two weeks vacation with 9 days pay, and those working not less than 840 hours shall get two weeks vacation with 8 days pay.

Speaking on the city street repair problem, he told the group that gas tax refund money was being used in overall improvements. In answer to questions about upkeep of streets, he said that the city did try to keep streets passable, but that it was up to the property owners to pave streets. He spoke of the present paving project coming up on South 10th.
