## 400 Golfers Will Take Part in 2nd Shrine Tourney

SALEM (Special)—Upwards of 400 golfers from all over Oregon will take part in the Second Annual Shrine Hospital Benefit tournament, sponsored by the Salem Shrine club, and dated for June 1st at the Salem Golf club.

The tournament, to be run off in one day, is open to all golfers. They will be segregated into four flights and will battle for over \$2,000 in valuable prizes. The championship flight will be for those with 0-5 handicaps. The first flight is to be for those with handicaps of 6-12; second flight 13-20 and third flight 21-27.

Sixteen four-man teams already have been entered in the club team match which will be played right along with regular tourney action. The winning team will receive a \$250 perpetual trophy, and thus far they have registered from Portland, Corvallis, Albany, Eugene, Klamath Falls, Bend and Salem.

Last year Bill Johnson of Corvallis won the tournament by shooting a two under par 70. Skip Nagler of Eugene was second with a 71 and Jack Russell of Salem was third with a 72. All will be entered again, along with such other top Oregon linksmen as Dick Yost of Portland, Bob Atkinson and Sid Milligan of Eugene, Ken Wilson of Albany and Bill Wittenberg of Salem.

First prize this year will be a lovely Bulova wrist watch and a 30 inch trophy. Approximately 60 other prizes, including a 12 cylinder Lincoln Zephyr auto and a woman's formal, have been lined up by the Shrine Club committee. Prizes will also be available for "best dressed golfers," etc.

Entry fee for the tournament is \$4.00, which will include green fee. Reservations can be made by contacting the Hospital Committee, 411 Masonic Bldg., Salem. Last year's tourney netted over \$400 for the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children.

As Memorial Day nears, The Newberg Boat club is nearing completion of its work on facilities to handle the largest list of entries and spectators ever entertained. As the list of entries for this boating classic grows, it appears that Newberg will entertain the greatest number of visitors ever for any single day's event.

Trophies sponsored by merchants in the community are being displayed in their respective windows.
