The division, a California National Guard unit, is holding a sector of the central Korean front south of battered Kumsong. It was transferred to Korea last December after having been part of the security force in Japan since April 1951.

Sergeant Russum, who entered the Army in November 1950, is serving in Battery A 143rd Field Artillery battalion.

Sewer Bond Bids

Hayes and Merryfield, which prepared the rate table, said he believed since the lumber firm had its own fire protection system that it should not be charged the 50 per cent higher rate. This also would apply to other such commercial users.

The contract with Woodard Lumber Co. will be revised with negotiations between the city and Mr. Woodard to continue. Mr. Woodard said he desired a 10-year contract, whereas the council stated it did not feel it should bind a future council to a contract and that rates charged should be prevailing rates.

Heavily Bonded

The problem of the sewer bond bids was discussed at length before the decision to re-advertise was reached. Councilman Richard Thwing said that Cottage Grove and the school districts were heavily bonded and outstanding obligations were near 50 per cent of valuation of the city. He added assessed valuations were not near real value.

He also read from "Trends," a bond pamphlet, that the tax exempt bond calendar was very heavy now. Councilman Joe Bricher said in answer he believed it would lighten.

"We are selling bonds at a difficult period," Thwing said.

"We should get a lower rate by re-advertising, however," Bricher said.

Low Plant Bidder

Mr. Roderick explained to the council that the delay in the bond sale would not make any difference in the construction bids, which can be put off 30 days. Mr. Roderick presented tabulations of the 12 bids, showing that Henry Den Herder of Lebanon was the low lump sum bidder on the plant with a bid of \$110,407.90. Equipment would raise the cost to \$151,049.90, which is somewhat under

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The \$220,000 originally estimated called for the first bond sale, by the engineers.

Final awarding of the contract bid will be stayed off until June 16 when the bond bids are opened. Joe Bricher moved that the one bid for the bonds be rejected and that the city re-advertise for bids on the sewer bonds. The vote was unanimous.

Council also instructed the city recorder to mail out the prospectus this time to all possible bond bidders. The prospectus was not sent last time and this factor was blamed by councilmen as one reason for the sole bid.

Council met briefly Monday, May 26, to pass a new ordinance providing for the sale of bonds and to repeal ordinance 1379 that

Reject Heating Bids
In other business May 22 council rejected bids for the new heating plant for the City Hall because the highest bidder alone provided a bond bid. Bids were H & S Plumbing and Heating Co., Eugene, \$1942.90; J. P. Walker Co., Cottage Grove, \$2035, and Roberts & Drury, Cottage Grove, \$2450. Council voted to re-advertise for bids and to furnish a bond blank with each bid. These will also be opened June 16.
