Eagles Lodge Will Sponsor Fish Contest for Children

The second Fish Derby of the summer has been announced by the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and will be open to children only up to 14 years of age.

First fish derby was sponsored earlier in the season by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Ed Keitzer, derby chairman, who himself is a sport enthusiast and original organizer of the Rod and Gun club here 18 years ago, said that there would be no entry fee for the contest and that prizes would be given each month to winners in two classes. Chubb and suckers only will be allowed to be entered for prizes.

Dates To Be Named
Starting date of the contest will be announced next week.

Also to be named are weighing stations. According to Mr. Keitzer, who is a director of the lodge, three prizes will be awarded according to weight and length of fish caught. There are also no restrictions as to where the fish may be caught.

It is believed this is the first such derby to be held here. Other members of the lodge committee planning the event are Oval Powell, Darrel Booher and Vern Booher.

AL MARTIN MAY NOT COMPETE IN NCAA MEET AT BERKELEY JUNE 13-14

Al Martin, University of Oregon sophomore miler, may not compete in the NCAA track meet at Berkeley, Calif., June 13 and 14. While here over the week end, Martin said he thought the fact that he would have to work-out on the track and make the trip to Berkeley during the final exams might take too much time needed for his studies.

At Portland Saturday in the AAU meet, Martin easily won the mile at 4:23 and went on to win second in the 880 yard run behind Jack Hutchins.

If Martin hangs up his track togs before the Berkeley meet, he can look back over his first season as a miler with fair to middling pride. He won four dual meets during the season, got second in the northern division meeting at Seattle and third in the FCC meet at Eugene, May 23 and 24 with a new time of 4:15.6. He said after the meet, he could have probably bettered his 4:15.6 time a little.

Midgets Lose 7-3 To Albany Squad

Cottage Grove's Midget baseball team lost 7-3 to a superior Albany squad in a practice game played at Kelly field Sunday.

Coach Bud Neal said Albany was one of the best Midget teams in the state but that the Grove squad played very well for its first game of the season.

A return practice game will be played at 8 p.m. Thursday, June 5, at Albany.

Cottage Grove got 3 runs from 7 hits and was credited with 2 errors. Albany got 7 runs from 10 hits and made 1 error.

Stewart Pitcher
Greg Stewart, ace Jefferson athlete, pitched the whole game, striking out 4 men and walking 5. Fox pitched for Albany, striking out 6 and walking 5.

Jim Nichols, the left fielder, was the hitting star for the local team, getting a triple with the bases loaded in the fifth inning, a single in the seventh, making it 2 for 2.

Ronald Rice, first baseman, got a double and a single in his three times up. Other Grovers getting hits were Minkler, 1 for 2; Ellsworth, 1 for 4, and Miller, 1 for 3.

Albany had three good innings, scoring 2 runs in the second; 4 in the third and 1 in the sixth. Cottage Grove's big inning was the fifth when 3 runs were scored off 2 hits.

Grove Threatens
Cottage Grove gave Albany a scare in the seventh when Rice led off with a double; Carter walked, and Nichols got on with a single, loading the bases. This made a real scoring threat, but Bailey popped out to center field; Stewart struck out, and Ellsworth popped out to the pitcher, ending the inning.

First regular game of the season in division play is set for June 17 at Thurston. Coach Neal said that Yoncalla might enter the division, which would necessitate rearranging the schedule. A complete, revised schedule will be run when it is available.

Lane Leads State In Beaver Catch

Trappers participating in the 1951-52 Oregon beaver trapping season, the first held in 20 years, have reported a take of 15,243 beaver pelts to the game commission.

Chester Kebbe, furbearing animal expert for the commission, values the catch at \$120,000 based on an average of \$9.73 received for all beaver pelts. Top prices for prime blanket pelts ranged between \$18 and \$22. Commission records show only 2,270 licensed trappers in the State, a reflection of the current low in the raw fur market.

Largest take of beaver was in the South Willamette valley and Columbia and Clatsop counties. Lane county with a catch of 2398 beaver led the State.

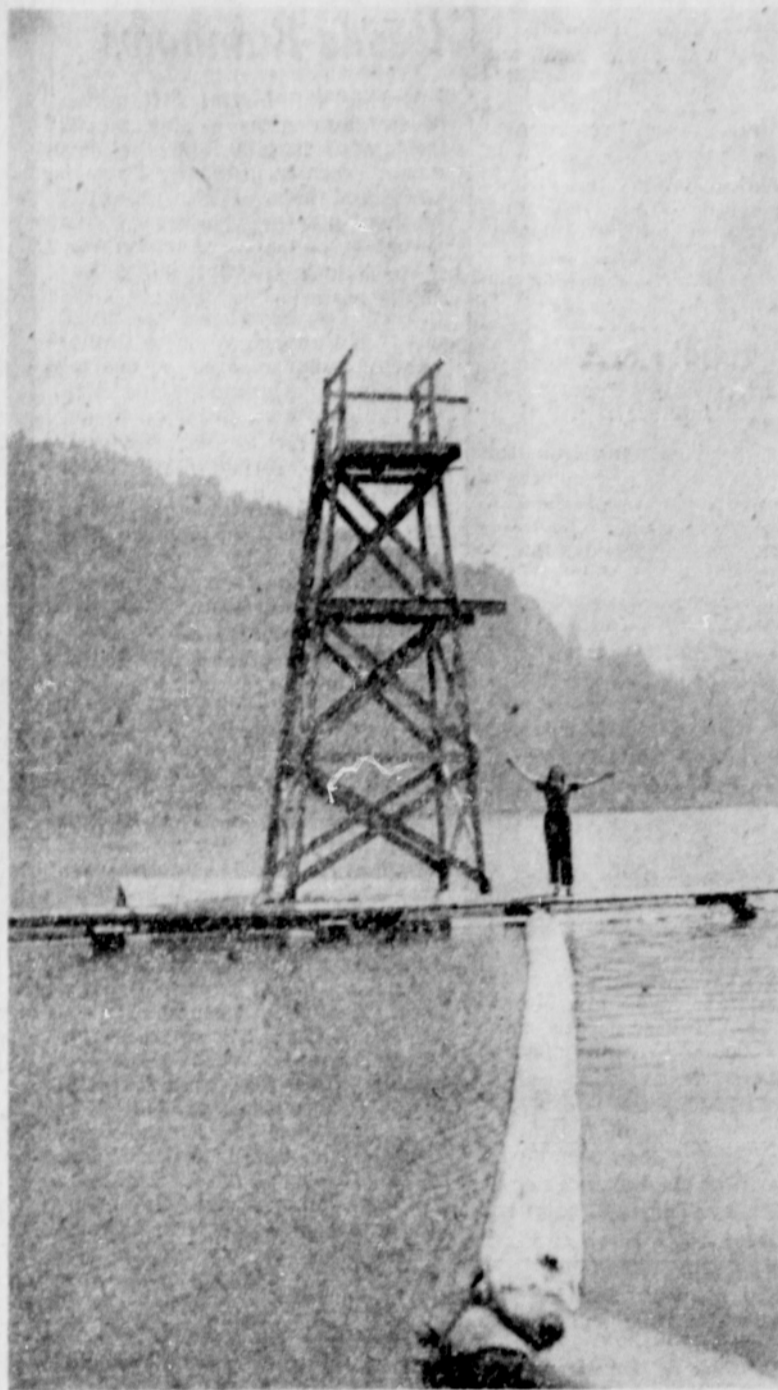

OSC, Fresno Meet In NCAA Playoffs

Oregon State College—Oregon State's Beavers, newly-crowned baseball champions of the Pacific Coast conference after two straight victories over USC, leveled their sights this week on another goal—the far-western NCAA playoffs with powerful Fresno State here Friday and Saturday.

Winner of the two-out-of-three game series this week end will receive the 8th district bid to the NCAA championships at Omaha for the "college world series" of baseball. The Omaha tournament, which opens on June 12, will feature eight district champions and will be double-elimination.

Oregon State and Fresno State both came through playoffs last weekend in impressive style. The Beavers whipped the Trojans, 12-10, and 5-4, while the Bulldogs were whipping Seattle university, 2-1 and 20-4. Fresno State will come to Corvallis as the champion independent team of the west, with OSC representing the PCC.
