ROTARY FISH SCREENS ACT AS WARDENS

Installation of 510 rotary fish screens for the 1952 irrigation season has been completed by game commission fishway and screen crews, and 28 additional new fish screens are being installed in Wasco, Hood River and Crook counties.

The rotary fish screens serve as "silent fish wardens," saving untold thousands of game and food fish that would otherwise be diverted into farm fields and pastures. Largest number of screens, 193, is located in the Rogue River basin.

Marlin Will Play In Shrine Classic



Count Shows Drop In State Pheasants

A drop in pheasant numbers over Oregon except for the Columbia basin and central section is indicated by observations of game agents who have completed counts on 400 pheasant sample areas.

North Willamette valley pheasant numbers dropped slightly while the South Willamette valley and Southwest Oregon showed a large drop over last year's count.

The best pheasant habitat in the state, Malheur county, has also suffered a drop as have Lake, Harney, and Klamath counties where severe winter was experienced.

A good increase in pheasant numbers were noted in central Oregon and in Wasco, Sherman, and Gilliam counties. Umatilla and Morrow counties also showed moderate increases, and pheasant numbers in Wallowa, Union, and Baker counties were down slightly. Mile long rectangles established in pheasant areas throughout the state and covered each spring are the basis for these trend counts.

Game commission Chief Biologist Bill Morse points out that with favorable weather and habitat conditions pheasants show a remarkable ability to bounce back in numbers, and the nesting season will largely determine the success of next fall's hunt. Pheasant brood counts will be taken in July prior to setting hunting regulations.

FISHERY AGENTS CHECK LIBERATION PROGRAM

Three spring Chinook jack salmon bearing marks of fish liberated in the Umpqua river in March, 1951 under a game commission plan for rehabilitating the Umpqua spring Chinook run thru plants of yearling salmon have been checked by Fishery Agents Bill Pitney and Ralph Grenfell.

These fish were raised at the Rock Creek hatchery until nearly 18 months old, the longest salmon have ever been reared by the commission. They were marked by fin clipping, and released in the lower Umpqua where observations showed they went directly to salt water.

Returns of adult salmon from the 1951 plant of 52,000 yearling salmon are not expected to appear in the Umpqua until the spring of 1954, the jacks being immature salmon.

OREGON TRAFFIC DEATHS REACH 28 FOR MAY

Twenty-eight persons died in Oregon street and highway accidents last month, according to a preliminary count of May fatality reports received by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

The May toll brings the death count for the year thus far to 135, as compared with 147 at the same time in 1951. Fatalities in May a year ago totalled 39.
