The 175 homemakers who attended were observing the council's 20th anniversary. They represent about 14,500 members of extension units in 28 counties.

She was presented the award by Mrs. Floyd Fox, Silverton, state scholarship chairman of the OHEEC.

Mrs. Clara Edaburn, OSC textiles and clothing professor, displayed clothing she had designed in her functional work dress project which is sponsored by the OHEEC. Her most popular innovation is a bias strip under the arm which gives extra reach through the sleeves and shoulders with less strain and more comfort. This has been incorporated into a dress pattern sold by a nationally-known pattern company, she told the women.

Overnight Camping Plan Established By Highway Group

The Highway commission is establishing, through its parks department, an overnight camping program for the pleasure and convenience of vacationing motorists. The list includes two improved camp sites for the accommodation of trailer units, one at Silver Creek the other at Walloa Lake state parks, with electric connections for light and cooking together with additional tent camps also with cooking, sanitary and other facilities furnished.

In addition to these two improved camping arrangements the commission and parks department is establishing overnight camping in 30 of the state parks scattered throughout the state, together with particular conveniences furnished in each park and the rates established in each instance.

8,063 VISITORS TOUR STATE CAPITOL IN MAY

Students and tourists visiting Oregon's capitol building in Salem during the month of May tallied 8,063. This averages about 269 persons a day, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry points out.

A total of 25 to 30 thousand visitors are expected during the next three peak months of vacationers, Newbry states. He believes these will include persons from all 48 states, the U. S. Territories, and many from foreign countries, with a majority from Canada.

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Lovely Bette Briggs, 23, of Columbus, Ohio, was the 4,000,000th visitor to see Chrysler Corporation's "New Worlds in Engineering" show, the touring automotive spectacle which has visited 12 cities in the last year. Miss Briggs is a student at Ohio State University. The \$1,000,000 automotive show is scheduled next for Philadelphia, Cincinnati, and Sacramento and Pomona, California, in addition to other major Pacific Northwest cities.

Traffic Violators Keep State Busy

Oregon drivers kept file clerks and typists in the Secretary of State's office more than busy during the first five months of this year.

During that time, the department's drivers license division recorded 17,278 traffic violation convictions on driving records of Oregonians. The figure exceeds that of the same period last year by nearly 2,000. Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry said.

During May, the department suspended 232 licenses after court convictions of driving while intoxicated, and 20 for reckless driving. Other reasons for suspension last month included: violation of the basic rule, 11; hit and run, 4; failure to yield right of way, 2; and driving record (too many accidents or violations), 5.

OSC Pharmacists Complete Survey Of Drug Costs

Oregon State College—It costs an average of \$2.33 to have a prescription filled at the corner drug store, according to a 5000-prescription survey made by two staff members of the OSC school of pharmacy.

One hundred consecutively numbered prescriptions from 50 drug stores, mainly in Oregon, were used in the study by Leo A. Sciuchetti, associate professor of pharmacognosy, and Shirley F. Roeder, pharmacy instructor.

Calculated average prices for various dosage forms were capsules, \$3.57; Powders, \$3.00; suppositories, \$2.38; miscellaneous, \$2.16; tablets, \$2.35; ointments, \$1.30, and liquids, \$1.75.

Weighing or measuring of ingredients was not required in 3343 or 66.8 percent of the total prescriptions. Sciuchetti and Miss Roeder found. The highest number of prescriptions, 4134 percent, were in tablet form.

Most drugs purchased, or 1263 of the 5000 prescriptions filled, were put to unclassified uses. Following were antibiotics, 957, second; sulfa, 598, third; barbiturate, 539 fourth; vitamins, 428, fifth; and antihistamine, 358, sixth.

In more than 88 percent of the

prescriptions, only a single ingredient was present, they said. This required ingredient making up the drugstore in less than 12 percent of the drug orders filled.

Results of the survey have been published in the June edition of Pacific Drug Review.

Civilian Defense, Armed Forces Test Scheduled for West

Civil defense officials of northwestern states met in Portland recently with representatives of the armed forces to plan a joint civil defense—armed forces exercise.

The exercise, scheduled in July, will be held throughout the eight western states. It will be the first interstate test conducted in the continental United States between the military and civil defense. The 6th Army, 4th Air Force, Western Air Defense Command, and Western Sea Frontier will work with Federal civil defense regional offices and civil defense organizations in the various states.

Purpose of the drill is to create a simulated war emergency for staff training, not for widespread public participation. It will test interstate civil defense cooperation, and the coordination of military activities with civil defense organizations. It also will test the extent of mutual aid forces available to stricken areas.
