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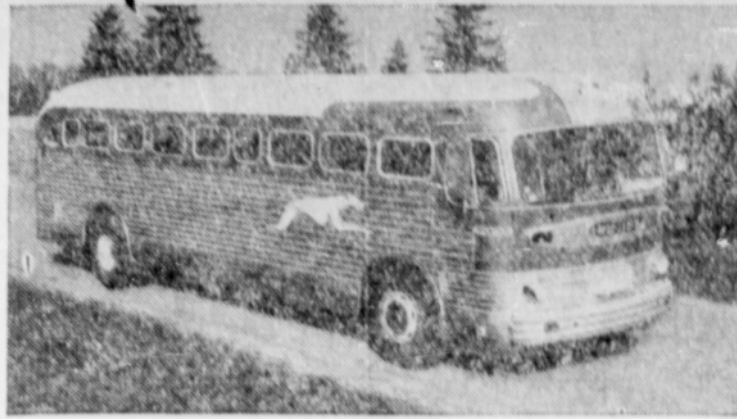

TO VISIT PORTLAND

Portland is one of 70 cities in the U. S. that will be visited by the "Alert America" convoy, it was announced this week by the Oregon civil defense agency.

It will be set up in an auditorium on Swan Island, Portland, from June 25 to 30, open to the public without charge.

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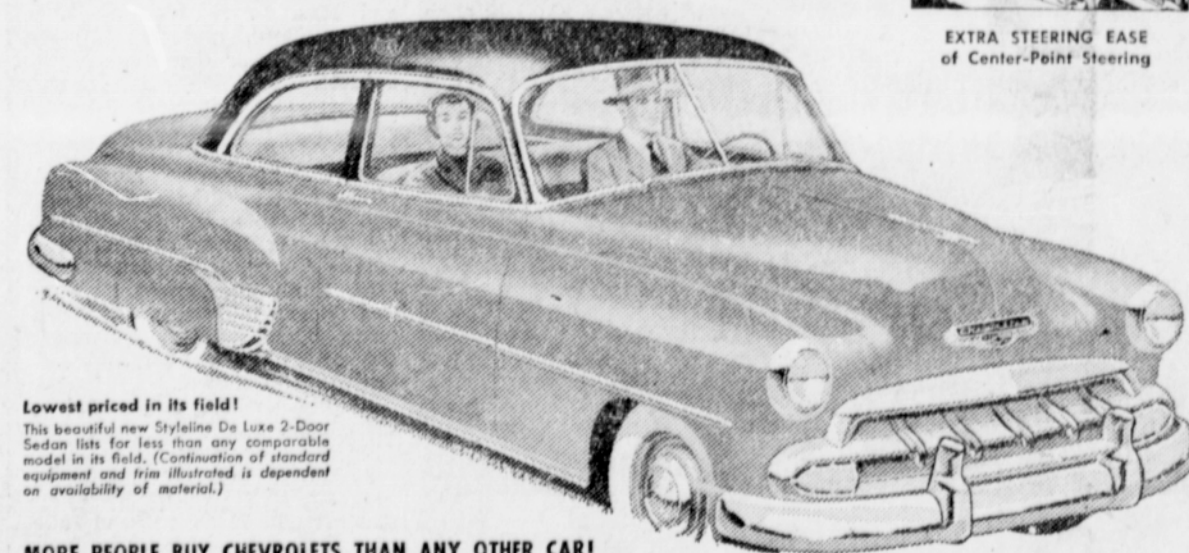
