Tests Set July 14 For Appointments To Military Schools

Congressman Harris Ellsworth has announced that competitive examinations for appointments to vacancies at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and the U. S. Military Academy at West Point will be conducted by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Monday, July 14, at the post office buildings in Albany, Coos Bay, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford, Reedsport and Roseburg.
Candidates for the academies must never have been married, and must be bonafide residents of the Fourth Congressional district. As of the date of entrance into the academies, July 1, 1953, appointees must be 17 years of age. The maximum entrance ages for Annapolis and West Point are 21 and 22 respectively. Candidates now in the armed services are eligible to compete.
The examination will be confined to vocabulary and reading, spatial relations and algebra. Nominations to the Academies will be on the basis of grades earned in the competitive examination.
Candidates desiring to compete should notify Congressman Harris Ellsworth, House Office Building, Washington, D. C., not later than June 20, indicating their choice of place for examination, legal residence, and date of birth.

Cal Stroh, Lane Co. Bee Inspector

State inspection of bees in Lane county this season is being carried on by Calvin H. Stroh of Cottage Grove and Herman Larsen of Junction City, who were recently appointed deputy apiary inspectors by the state department of agriculture. Larsen formerly worked in the same capacity for the state.
Besides routine inspections, these men are authorized to issue moving permits, and under the 1951 bee law all colonies of bees moved any place in the state must have this permit, which costs 25 cents per colony. All bees, whether Oregon or imported, must also be registered with the department. The law sets a registration fee of \$2 for the beekeeper, plus 25 cents for each colony owned or in possession of the beekeeper.
Any bees coming into the state—and department officials estimate about 15,000 colonies from other states will come in on a rental basis for crop and orchard pollination this season—may come in on state inspection certificates. But when they leave Oregon they must have a moving permit.
Under a new California regulation, bees coming in from that state and remaining more than 60 days after their last inspection must have a new inspection certificate before leaving Oregon to show freedom from American foulbrood and other bee diseases. Such inspections are made on the basis of time and per diem.
Most of the imported bees will enter Jefferson and Klamath counties for seed pollination rentals. The standard rental rate this year is \$7 per colony per season. Some Oregon bees will also be moved into those areas for the growing season. Movement started in late May and is now reaching its peak.

In the dancing events youngsters will display the best in grace, energy and tempo in traditional steps of the highland fling and sword dance.

The initial gathering, under the auspices of the Associated British Societies of Portland, will give many in this area the first opportunity of hearing massed pipe bands and to see an outstanding display of color.
