Marcola defeated Creswell Sunday. The Cottage Grove-Coburg score was 5-1.

High school players took over the pitching spots for the local team, with Hoyer in for four innings, relieved by Higdon. Catchers were Malcolm and Vogler. Errors racked the Grove bunch, with 11 racked up against the team.

The game also was almost devoid of extra base hits, the only one socked by Joe Sage, Coburg's left fielder, a double in the first inning. Coburg got four of its five runs in the first.

Three Grove men getting two hits out of four times at bat were Don Campbell, second baseman; Hershel Tracy, first baseman, and Hal Wicks, short stop.

Sage for Coburg got two for five, with Smith, the first baseman, getting two for four times at bat.

WILD TROUT EGG-TAKES COMPLETED AT LAKES

Wild trout egg-takes have been completed at East and Diamond lakes by game commission spawning crews who took 1,100,000 rainbow eggs at East Lake and 545,000 rainbow eggs at Diamond Lake.

A third wild trout egg-take was completed earlier this year on Spencer creek near Klamath Falls where over 1 million eggs were obtained. The commission has also purchased another 2,000,000 rainbow eggs in Idaho.

Rainbow spawn late at both East Lake and Diamond lakes, and as usual the spawning crews went in via snow-cats early in May to begin the egg-take as soon as the ice-cover broke.

Chukar Partridge Crop Is Assured

Oregon's first large crop of Chukar partridges for stocking in Eastern Oregon is believed assured at the Hermiston game farm where special electric brooders designed and built by Game Farm Superintendent Roy Dickinson have successfully raised 99 percent of the young Chukars now three weeks old.

For the past two years the game commission has tried without success to raise large numbers of Chukars. Parasites and diseases acquired by the Chukars from domestic brood hens made heavy inroads.

Liberation sites for the Chukars have been carefully selected by game agents, who have taken into consideration all the requirements of these exotic game birds. The sites chosen are the brakes of the John Day, Deschutes, Owyhee, and Blitzen river canyons. Old birds used for brood stock will be turned loose in July, and the young birds will be liberated in August.

Amateur Radio Class Offered Air Reserve

Hamilton, Calif.—An extensive program for Volunteer Air Force reservists who are either trained or interested in amateur radio operations has been announced by Major General William E. Hall, Commanding General, Fourth Air Force.

Under provisions of the new "MARS" (Military Amateur Radio Service) program, surplus radio equipment is available to any volunteer air reservist who holds a Federal Communications commission amateur radio operators license for at least the novice level. The "HAM" equipment will be issued on a "no-accountability" basis. It can be dismantled or modified but cannot be commercialized or sold.

When a "HAM" station becomes operational, its operator will be required to maintain a training log for submission to net control officer.

Special training in communications, voice, CW and theory will be offered the reservist.

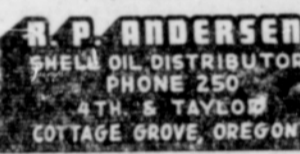
