School Elections

About 70 attended the school board election Tuesday evening, August 10, when C. B. Mitchell was elected director for a three-year term. His opponents were W. C. Singhouse and Russell Alford.

Arvid Rothauge, a member of the school board, explained several courses open to the district for obtaining two much needed classrooms before school starts in the fall. The present set-up of having the four upper grades meet in the basement of the high school building has been condemned by the state inspector.

He stated that the cheapest and most satisfactory solution would be to build the new rooms as an annex to the present grade school building, using the present heating system with a few changes.

Remodeling work is now going on at the grade school building. Partitions between the main classrooms and coat rooms are being removed, which adds between four and five extra feet of usable space in each room. The blackboards are getting a new green surface, and the rooms are all being painted. The ceilings will be white and the walls a pale flat green. The halls will be refinished in their present colors of cream and chocolate brown.

Mr. Rothauge stated that the district now has \$13,000 in the building fund, but this will not be enough to complete the two needed classrooms so a special election may be necessary in the near future to vote on a bond issue.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Baker of Castle Rock, Wash., spent a couple of days last week with his brother, J. C. Baker, and wife.

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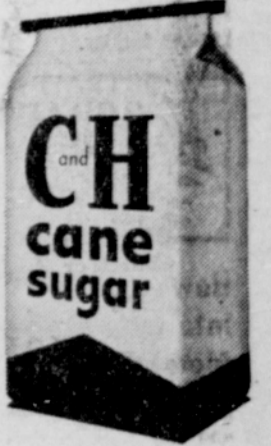
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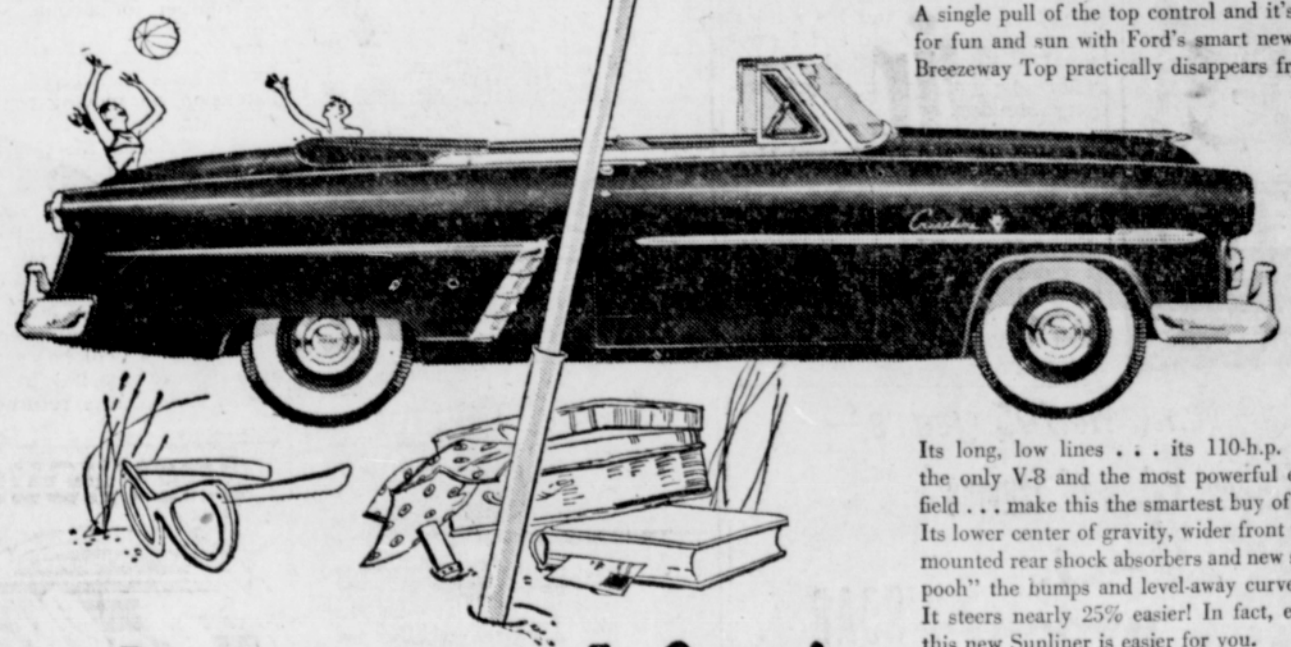
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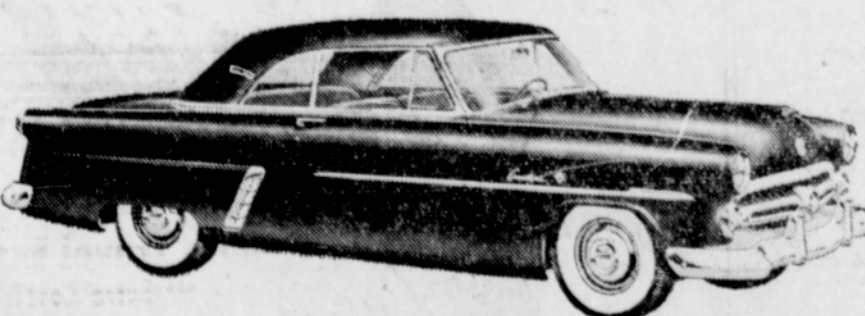
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
