Certified Talent Alfalfa Seed Rules Announced

Beginning next year, only foundation and registered Talent alfalfa seed stock will be eligible to plant for further certification, Oregon State college has announced.

All fields will be classified this year and none will be lower than certified providing all other requirements are met, the announcement said. Plantings classified as certified, meanwhile, will produce seed that is eligible for blue tag. This seed cannot be planted back for further certification.

Talent, similar to Ranger and all other new varieties in the Oregon certification program, will be increased under a generation plan. This program was discussed recently with growers in southern Oregon and has their indorsement. Originally developed on the Southern Oregon branch experiment station, the new alfalfa variety was grown last year under certification by 130 growers located in Douglas, Gilliam, Jackson, Jefferson, and Josephine counties. Contrasting to 1938 when 10 growers in Jackson county produced seed on 112 acres, the total reached 2,078 acres in 1951.

All fields entered for certification since 1947 when first field inspections were made have been traced through and classified on basis of planting stock used.

Advantages attributed to the new alfalfa variety include its early spring growth which starts 10 to 14 days ahead of other varieties, rapid regrowth after cutting, and long-lived stands.

Last year, 27 acres of foundation, 509 acres of registered seed has passed for certification. Seed of both classifications as well as certified seed for general forage use is available.

Dairy Scientists Working to Cut Breeding Losses

An important role is being played by Oregon State college in the search for ways to reduce the estimated \$5 million loss suffered annually by Oregon dairymen as a result of breeding inefficiencies such as delayed conception.

Dairy scientists from OSC reported on their progress in the search at the national meeting of the American Dairy Science Association June 24 to 26.

Members of the OSC dairy husbandry department told the nation's dairy scientists about the college's work with fertility, semen quality and a simple test for determining pregnancy in dairy cows.

Among the scientific papers presented at the meeting was a report by John H. Byers, OSC research assistant, which outlined early results of his work on a new pregnancy test. Byers declared the test to be 91 percent accurate in limited experiments to date, but warned that his results are not complete and may not hold up in future trials.

The OSC scientist said he got the idea for the new test from a German scientist, W. Schlor, who developed a pregnancy test for humans. Byers adapted the test for dairy cattle.

Urine samples were collected from 136 cows. A chemical was added and the color reaction showed whether the cows were pregnant. Outstanding advantages of the test are its simplicity and speed—a farmer could do it in his own barn and know whether his cow was pregnant within a week after breeding. Byers was careful to point out, however, that he is not yet prepared to recommend the test without further experimentation.

If it proves valid in future trials, it could become an important money and timesaver for dairymen. A quick test for pregnancy would save valuable weeks in the breeding process. Byers explained that about 10 percent of the dairy cows in most herds have trouble conceiving. They lose and average of 60 days each in becoming pregnant. In a 100-cow herd this means 600 lost days, or two complete lactations plus two calves. This costs the dairyman money that can be saved with a quick and accurate test for pregnancy.

Robert Anderson Awarded Tuition Scholarship at OSC

Oregon State College, Corvallis, (Special)—Robert Dee Anderson, a 1932 Cottage Grove high school graduate, has been awarded a tuition scholarship to attend Oregon State college during the 1952-53 school year, according to Dallas W. Norton, chairman of the OSC scholarship committee.

Ninety-two high school seniors were selected as winners. Awarded on a competitive basis, these scholarships are valued at \$90, and will cover tuition and partial fees. Basis for selection includes academic achievement and reasonable financial need.

All total 173 scholarships were granted. These included 32 foreign students, 19 Alaskan and Hawaiian students, and 30 persons with previous work at OSC.

Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Anderson, Rt. 1, Box 436, Cottage Grove, ranked in the upper 20th of his class scholastically. He received an award in recognition of his high scholastic standing, and was a member of the National Honor society. Other activities include member of the high school band, the Lane county junior symphony orchestra, and the first all-state high school orchestra.

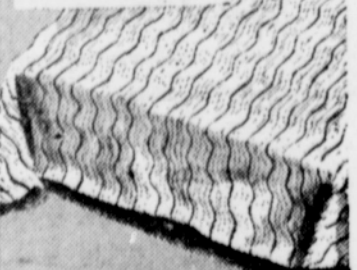
