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Oregon's Dairy Industry Valued At 57 Million

"Good eating for all ages" is this year's June dairy month slogan, says Harold Ewalt of Oregon State college who adds that the annual total cash farm income from dairy products in the state is almost \$50,000,000.

Another \$8,000,000 worth of dairy products is consumed on farms, bringing the total gross value of the industry to about \$57,000,000. This figure excludes value of dairy animals sold for meat.

The OSC extension dairy specialist also points out that milk prices are not high today in relation with the price level of "all foods" as compared with pre-war. He says the retail price of fresh delivered milk has advanced 75 percent while the retail prices of foods generally have been upped 102 percent since pre-war days.

Ewalt says a recent survey shows that seven out of ten housewives select milk as the most important food to use in feeding their families. Nutritionists, meanwhile, go along with the view that no food is more important to man's welfare nor does more for the body.

A common question in the minds of many consumers is "What becomes of the milk company's dollar?" Ewalt says more than 60 cents of it goes to farmers for milk; almost 20 cents is spent for labor; close to another 20 cents is taken by equipments, supplies and other overhead expenses leaving less than two cents profit per sales dollar.

1877 Attend 4-H Summer School

The 1877 boys and girls attending the 1952 4-H summer school at Oregon state college will wind up the 37th annual session in a gala mood Thursday evening, June 26, with square dancing and party games in the Coliseum and ballroom dancing in the Memorial Union.

Co-presidents this year were Betty Stellmacher, 18, Albany, and Dave Estergard, 17, Harrisburg. By coincidence, both are sheep raisers, with Betty specializing in registered Southdowns and Romneys, and Dave raising registered Suffolks.

Dozens of other 4-H club members received leadership experience by serving as presidents of the 37 housing units, presiding over general assemblies, and taking part in other programs.

Other youngsters displayed musical, dancing, and dramatic talents in an amateur show and in the annual 4-H Radio Revue which was broadcast over KOAC.

Many Corvallis residents attended the 4-H Sunday morning services in the coliseum. Dr. James C. Miller, of the Good Citizenship Foundation, Portland, gave the sermon and a special 4-H choir provided music.

At one assembly, a colorful, hand-woven, hand-embroidered tablecloth was presented to the 4-H'ers, as representatives of 4-H'ers throughout the nation, by the children of Yugoslavia. Mrs. Mira Kovacevic, one of 21 foreign home economists who attended a special 8-week extension short course at OSC, made the presentation. She explained that Yugoslavian youth feel a strong friendship for American children.
