Oregon Farm Post Use Is Estimated At Over 4,500,000

It's a lot of fence posts any way you look at it.

Charles R. Ross, Oregon State college extension farm forestry specialist, says the U. S. Forest service has come up with a figure that Oregon farmers use 4,500,000 new wood fence posts annually. The figure does not include a sizeable amount of small timbers used for corrals, bridges and other on-farm uses.

Here's a breakdown of tree varieties which furnish the posts. In addition to split red or incense cedar which provide approximately one-half the total, Juniper yields 750,000; ponderosa pine, 450,000; lodgepole pine, 330,000; larch, 360,000; Douglas fir, 240,000; and Oregon white oak, 100,000.

Ross estimates that half the fence posts produced are grown in farm and small wood lands. Almost 9 of 10 posts that go into the ground are untreated wood. A principal reason for lack of treatment is the fact that split cedar does not lend itself well to home treatment and will usually last 10 to 12 years without it.
