Market Law Lifted To Speed Up Sale Of Damaged Timber

The Secretary of the Interior has granted special authority to the Pacific Northwest region of the Bureau of Land Management to remove marketing area restrictions on salvage timber sales for tracts which do not receive bids at the initial offering.

Roscoe E. Bell, regional administrator of Region I, said the restrictions were lifted after a recent recommendation by the O & C advisory board to that effect, and Bell's request to Secretary Chapman asking that the speed-up procedure be followed on tracts of dead or damaged timber which receive no bids after the first advertising.

The regular policy of the BLM in western Oregon provides that timber must be advertised for sale and restricted to its marketing area, which in most cases means that it will receive primary manufacture from logs into rough lumber within the major river drainage where the timber grew. After being sawed into rough lumber, it can be transported anywhere for remanufacture.

Under the new authority, if the timber does not sell to a mill within the marketing area, it may be sold within 90 days without advertising to any firm or company inside or outside the marketing area in western Oregon, and may be removed as saw logs or any other form of forest products. It is believed that this will be an important factor in utilizing the maximum amount of BLM salvage timber, which may reach more than one billion board feet.

Boards Issue Call To Induct Doctors As Replacements

Oregon State Headquarters, Selective Service System, has announced that local boards in Oregon had been instructed to issue orders to report for induction to five (5) Priority No. 1 special registrant physicians who will be required to report on August 28.

"It is obvious," said Colonel Francis W. Mason, deputy state director, "that this may be considered but a forerunner of regular and consistent calls for physicians. It should be remembered, that in the ensuing months there will be released from active duty in the armed forces those men who were called in two years ago and it will be necessary to provide replacements for them and also provide adequate medical personnel for any increase there may be in the armed forces."

Colonel Mason called attention to the fact that already all priority No. 1 and 2 dentists available for service have been called on alerted for such call in the near future and stated that all signs indicated a similar condition would exist as to physicians by the end of this year.

"To the present time," concluded Colonel Mason, "there has been ample time between the issue of the order to report for induction and the date set for such induction for these special registrants to apply for and be granted a commission. However it must be remembered that only ten days is required and if the time lag is materially shortened, some physicians and dentists are liable to find themselves inducted as privates."

Colonel Mason added that physicians and dentists subject to induction could choose the branch of the service they preferred by applying for a commission direct, if at the same time immediate active duty was requested, otherwise such applications had to be routed through Selective Service State Headquarters.

Old Sobriety Tests Give Way to Meter

University of Oregon—The only sure way to determine whether or not a person is "under the influence" of alcohol liquor is by a chemical analysis of the percentage of alcohol in his blood, said Dr. Leon A. Greenberg of Yale university in an address at the Oregon School of Alcohol Studies in session here last week.

Dr. Greenberg, research associate in applied physiology at Yale, made the statement in emphasizing his contention that so-called "sobriety tests" used by police in determining the degree of intoxication of automobile drivers, are invalid. Such tests, Dr. Greenberg said, are for "intoxication," which is merely the behavior of the individual, and do not determine whether a man's faculties have actually been impaired by alcohol.

Demonstrates Alcometer Dr. Greenberg demonstrated use of the "Alcometer," a device of his own invention, to determine the alcohol content of the blood.

The purpose of the summer session of the alcohol studies school was to acquaint physicians, ministers, nurses, teachers, social workers, law enforcement officers and other interested persons with the recent scientific developments related to the problems of beverage alcohol.

The school was sponsored by the School of Education at the state university, and the Oregon Alcohol Education committee, a division of the Oregon Liquor Control commission.

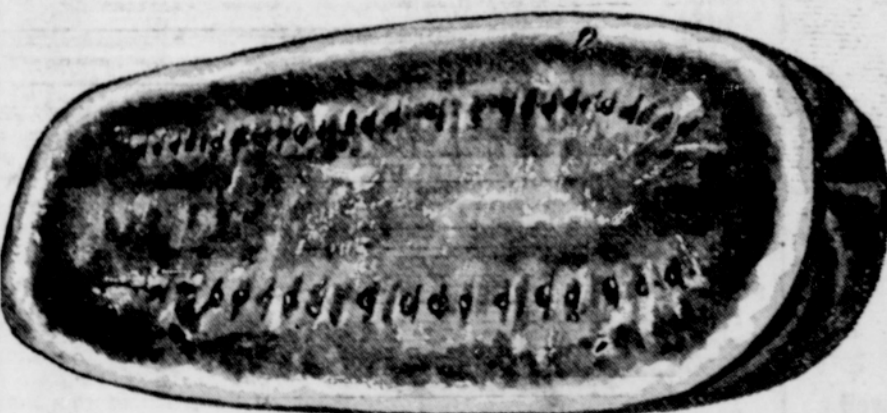

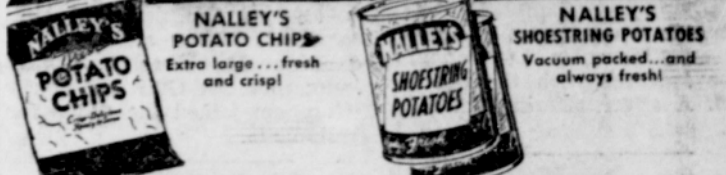
