Recommendations for Oregon's 1952 hunting regulations will be discussed Friday, July 11 beginning at 9 a.m. standard time in the game commission's Portland headquarters at SW 16th avenue and Alder street.

All parties interested in regulations regarding seasons, bag limits, methods of taking game animals, game birds, and furbearing animals are invited to attend. It is requested that all important facts and statements be submitted in writing.

Tentative regulations will be set after the hearing and the commission will reconvene Friday, July 25, to set the final 1952 hunting regulations.

Hospitality Day will be observed at Rockaway, Brighton, Wheeler, Nehalem and Manzanita, with free clam chowder is served to visitors on July 20.

Sporting events are listed at Portland, Mount Hood American Legion Club, Tilly Jane Camp, July 19-20 and Lebanon Aviation Day, Lebanon, July 27. Soap Box Derbys are scheduled around the state on July 13, including those listed at Astoria, Medford and Salem.

Portland's Fuchsia Society will stage its show at the Visitors Information Center, July 26, and Brookings holds its Annual Lily Parade July 13. The Order of the Antelope holds its outing July 18-20 at Hart Mountain.

## Fishways Planned Over State Falls

Construction of fishways over the South Umpqua and Steamboat Falls has been announced by representatives of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Oregon Game Commission.

The projects will be undertaken with funds coming to the state from the Dingle-Johnson Act, which distributes excise taxes on angling equipment to states providing 25 per cent matching funds.

The fishways will provide a way for fish to migrate at low water levels. Now the falls in both the South Umpqua river and in Steamboat Creek can be negotiated by fish at high water stages only.

According to a statement made by James Vaughn, regional game supervisor, by opening passages over the two obstructions it will be possible to open many additional miles of spawning beds. He also said that future logging operations also might damage steel head spawning conditions below the barrier at Steamboat Creek. The improvement on the South Umpqua is planned to help spring Chinook salmon which now congregate below the falls in large numbers.

## ROGUE PUBLIC ACCESS PROJECT IS ANNOUNCED

Details of a public fishing access project comprising 44 access points on the Rogue river between Gold Beach and Prospect located 150 miles upstream have been revealed by State Game Director P. W. Schneider.

Lands adjacent to the famed Rogue river but outside national forests are for the most part privately owned and free public access is barred.

"In some locations a fee is charged to reach the river, and there is urgent need for free public access to sites where boats can be launched as well as for bank angling," says Game Director Schneider who regards the fishing access program one of the most significant ever launched by the game commission.

## Boat, Bank Anglers To Have Accesses To McKenzie River

Permanent access to the McKenzie river for boat and bank anglers will be assured when a project announced by State Game Director P. W. Schneider is completed.

The game commission has approved 20 access points on the McKenzie river for development through easements and agreements with private landowners. No access problem exists above Blue River where national forest lands adjoin the McKenzie, but elsewhere in the popular McKenzie recreation area good boat launching sites are rare.

Funds obtained by the game commission under the Dingle-Johnson act which provides federal aid with fishing tackle excise tax money will be used to develop the access points.

## Roads to Be Built

None of the McKenzie access points is more than an acre in size, but there is room for construction of roadways to the stream, boat launching skids and slips, and parking areas. Other improvements will include brush removal, grading, and fencing to protect adjoining private lands. Funds will be set aside for annual maintenance of the access points.

The McKenzie access project is the third undertaken by the game commission. Malheur reservoir where a cattle guard, a roadway, and fencing secured a public use agreement from the landowners was completed last month. An access project comprising 44 sites on the Rogue river is underway.

Investigation of access problems on the Sandy, Nestucca, Umpqua, Deschutes, and New rivers by commission agents is continuing.
